

Election Returns Of News-Review Service Prompt

Exceptionally complete returns for a primary election were secured by the News-Review Friday night as a result of outstanding cooperation furnished by scores of volunteer assistants throughout the county.

Glendale precinct won honors as the first to report its complete count, being closely followed by Deer Creek precinct in Roseburg. Other precincts reporting within the first hour after the polls closed included Olalla, Cow Creek, Dixonville, Booth, Wilbur, Canyonville and Melrose. Returns poured into the News-Review office by telephone and messenger until after 2 a. m.

The News-Review is particularly grateful to members of election boards who assisted in making the tabulation by telephoning their reports. Greatly appreciated also is the service given by telephone operators throughout the county and particularly at the busy Roseburg switchboard, and the help given by County Clerk Roy Agee and numerous others who assisted in the speedy gathering of results.

All members of the News-Review and KRNK election staff are especially thankful to Attorney and Mrs. Dexter Rice, who brought proceedings temporarily to a halt shortly before midnight, when they appeared at the News-Review office with baskets of food and thermos jugs of coffee. When work of tabulation ceased at 3 a. m. Saturday, pending the arrival of the morning shift at 6 a. m. only three precincts, Loon Lake, West Reedport and Smith River, were unreported. Loon Lake was unable to send in its returns due to lack of telephone facilities.

Edgar Smith was given a two-to-one lead over Walter W. Whitbeck for the democratic nomination for United States senator, a trend followed in the state voting, thus making the Multnomah county farmer an opponent to the winner of the Holman-Morse contest.

Dewey Heavy Favorite
Douglas county republicans indicated their preference for Thomas E. Dewey, governor of New York, as the republican candidate for president, the write-in being preponderantly in his favor. The unofficial tabulation covers the write-in vote from only about one-half of the county's precincts and, therefore, is not complete, but indicates conclusively the trend.

U. S. Rep. James W. Mott, only one of Oregon's four republican congressmen opposed in the primary, won renomination two to one.

Attorney General George Neuner, serving by appointment, defeated his opponent, L. L. Lomax, by more than two to one on the face of latest returns.

Warren for Second Place

Oregon voters, who favored Dewey in the republican presidential preference primary, made Gov. Earl Warren of California the first choice for vice president of those who took the trouble to write in names.

There were no names on the ballot, either for president or vice president, but 856 write-in votes for Warren were reported today, 9 for Wendell Willkie and 12 for General Douglas MacArthur.

On the democratic side, where president Roosevelt's name was the only one listed on the ticket, write-in voters gave vice president Henry A. Wallace 245.

The vice presidential write-ins are meaningless. Oregon national party convention delegations will be instructed only for president—republicans for Dewey, democrats for Roosevelt.

Churchill Downs Fire Kills Nine Race Horses

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 20—(AP)—Nine race horses and one pony were destroyed early today when fire razed one of the barns at historic Churchill downs.

Hundreds of thoroughbreds were stabled at the track but only about 30 had to be turned loose.

Value of the nine horses lost in the fire was variously estimated at from \$30,000 to \$50,000. There was no outstanding racer among them.

Iowa Storms Kill Five; Damage Set at \$1,000,000

DES MOINES, Ia., May 20—(AP)—At least five persons were killed, more than 20 others were injured and property damage was estimated at \$1,000,000 as a result of tornadoes, floods and torrential rains in Iowa in the last two days.

Thousands of acres of farm lands were inundated as the heavy rain of the spring, accompanied by strong winds, struck in the northwest and central sections of the state.

Dewey's Strength Gets Oregon Boost

Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York picked up 15 delegates to the republican national convention in the politically strategic Northwest yesterday (Friday) to increase his lead to a point which stopped now in the race for GOP presidential nomination.

Latest reports from 781 (complete) of Oregon's 1828 precincts gave Dewey 16,092 to 2,028 for Lt. Commander Harold E. Stassen, former Minnesota Governor, in a preferential primary. Gov. Bricker of Ohio, Dewey's leading foe in the race for delegates, polled only 1,027.

Dewey hasn't said yet whether he's a candidate. Bricker is an active campaigner for the nomination. Stassen has indicated he's receptive.

The New York governor's cache of pledged and claimed delegates was swollen to a probable 352 by the Oregon victory and the disputed action of Alabama republicans in pledging their state's delegation to him.

President Roosevelt, who can have renomination if he wants it, picked up 14 additional delegates in the Oregon voting to boost his total to 697 of the 830 thus far chosen by the democrats. The President also was pledged the support of a new liberal party organized in New York last night by right wingers who broke away from the American Labor party.

Jap Navy Absent

In the great operation deep in enemy-held regions of the Pacific the Japanese navy failed to offer the slightest resistance. It had a chance, presumably, to meet on this occasion the first sizable allied naval force to penetrate eastern Netherlands Indies waters since the Japanese won the battle of the Java sea two years ago.

The carrier-borne planes destroyed 19 enemy aircraft on the ground in the strike at Soerabaja, which is on Java to the northwest of Darwin, Australia.

Of the few enemy planes that accepted the allied challenge, two were shot down.

While protecting fighters circled overhead the British-American carrier bombers scored direct hits on ten vessels aggregating 35,000 tons. Only one ship was seen to blow up but reports from the fleet said others probably sank.

The greatest damage was inflicted around the harbor where an oil refinery and vital engineering works were wrecked and two floating docks were damaged. For this achievement the allied force had to pay with only three planes and lost no surface vessels.

The raid was the second into the enemy-held Dutch East Indies. A carrier force from the southeast Asian command, aided by a force from the central Pacific, raided northwestern Sumatra and nearby Sabang in mid-April.

Under Dutch administration Soerabaja was built into one of east's great ports, equipped to handle and repair surface ships and submarines.
