## Vets Win Over Newcomers For Legislative Jobs

PORTLAND, May 22—(AP)—Veterans won over newcomers in Oregon legislative races but final returns will not be known for several days because of the large number of positions with heavy write-in votes.

In the only senate contest outside Multnomah county, Marius Petersen, Klamath Falls, defeated Melvin Dix, Bend, for the democratic nomination in the 18th district.

Multnomah's nominees for its five senate seats: republicans—Sen. Jack Lynch, Frank Deich, W. W. Banks, Frank H. Hilton and Sen. Coe A. McKenna; democrats—Sens. Thomas R. Mahoney and Lew Wallace, Jack T. Summerville, William J. Murray and Walter J. Pearson.

Benton county voters wrote in the name of Howard Hand, former Corvallis mayor, for Rep. A. Rennie who died a few days before election.

## Leslie P. Miller, Education Leader Of Douglas, Dies

Leslie Phelps Miller, 63, well known resident of Douglas county and Yoncalla, died at his home in Hayhurst valley today after a long illness. He was born in the Hayhurst vicinity, May 7, 1881, and was married in Eugene in 1908. He was a graduate of the Drain Normal school and the University of Oregon and had taught school for a number of years, during nine of which he was principal of the Yoncalla schools and at Drain for three years. He was also one of the first organizers of the Union high school idea and organized Union High school district No. 9 at Yoncalla. He was a member of the Methodist church.

Surviving Mr. Miller are the wife, Mrs. Lulu B. Miller, and two daughters, Mrs. Juanita Gale, Lakeview, and Mrs. George Nimi, Salem, and five grandchildren; also his mother, Mrs. Emma Miller, Yoncalla; three brothers, B. Herman Miller, Eureka, Calif., Commander J. M. Miller, Washington, D. C., and J. G. Miller, Charleston, W. Va., and a sister, Mrs. Ida Montgomery, Los Angeles. The body has been removed to the Stearns mortuary, Oakland and funeral services will be announced later.
