Donations Asked For Fund to Train Blind-Aiding Dogs

Under sponsorship of the Douglas county court, solicitation is being conducted by mail this week on behalf of Oregon Guiding Friends, Inc., an organization formed to train dogs to lead the blind. County courts, at a meeting of the state association, agreed to sponsor the cause on a statewide scale, each county judge being made chairman for his own county and the commissioners completing each committee.

In order to save time and manpower, the solicitation is being conducted by mail and letters are being sent out to several thousand residents of the county requesting financial help for the organization. Return, postage paid envelopes are enclosed with each letter for the convenience of contributors. The cost of solicitation is being handled privately and not from public funds, the committee stated.

Oregon Guiding Friends has its headquarters at Tillamook and was instituted by Colonel Stewart P. Arnold, who was blinded during the first World war, and who for several years has had the benefit of a "Seeing Eye" dog. Due to the fact that large numbers of veterans of the current war and Oregon men and women engaged in industrial plants

are expected to be blinded by combat and industrial accidents, it is proposed to provide organization supported by public contributions to furnish training for both dogs and the blind without cost to the blinded person.

A large sum of money will be needed to start the work, Judge D. N. Busenbark stated, and Douglas county residents are urged to contribute liberally to the activity.

Maritime Service Seeks Applicants

Young men between the ages of 16 and 17 1/2 are now being accepted by the U. S. maritime service as trainees for the merchant marine. It was announced today. All applicants must have their parents' consent, and in states which require it, a work permit from the board of education.

Those applying for the stewards department will receive six weeks training before being sent to sea, and those applying for the deck and engine departments, 13 weeks training. Graduates will be assigned to vessels within a few weeks.

No men between the ages of 18 and 26 are being accepted for training, except those classified as L or 1-C classification, the War Shipping Administration announcement said. There is an urgent need, however, for all qualified men between the ages of 26 and 35 and 1/2 for the deck and engine departments, and 26 and 50 and 1/2 for the stewards department.

Applicants may apply at their nearest local U. S. maritime enrolling office, or the nearest U. S. employment service office.

Portland Short of Shoes For Small Children

PORTLAND, May 24—(AP)—Portland mothers trod empty-handed from shoestores today and decided that junior had better go barefoot this summer.

For children from one to six years old there weren't, buyers reported, enough shoes to go around. One shop, which stocked at least 200 pairs in pre-war days, was down to two. "We are forced to turn away from 75 to 100 parents every day," the manager said.

The shortage—limited almost entirely to small children's shoes—is now under study by the office of civilian requirements.

Arneson Freed on Basis Of Future Fine Payment

Roy Grant Arneson, 29, recently fined \$450 in justice court on two charges of operating a motor vehicle following revocation of license and for failure to stop at the scene of an accident, was released from custody today. Justice of the Peace Thomas Hartfel reported that the \$50 for failure to stop at the scene of an accident was paid and that Arneson, a logger, was paroled to his employer conditional upon future payment of the fines of \$200 each on the two counts of driving without a license.
