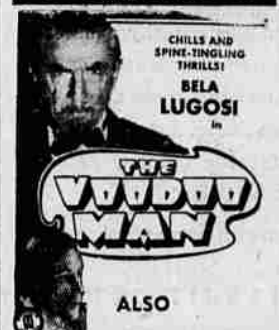
Shops and Visits—Mrs. Lillian Spain of Melrose spent Wednesday in Roseburg shopping and visiting friends.

Combat Experiences as Liberator Bomber Pilot Over Germany Told by Capt. "Bob" Insley, on Furlough Here

Prior to the outbreak of war, George R. "Bob" Insley, now Captain Insley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Insley, Happy Valley, had made only one trip outside the state of Oregon and that was a short excursion into northern California. He is back home now after having travelled through nearly all of the states, twice across the Atlantic ocean, on and over much of the face of England and between 60,000 and 100,000 miles over the airways of continental Europe.

His jaunts over Europe were not pleasure trips for those on the ground, for, in the course of 28 missions as pilot of a Liberator bomber, he has dropped in the neighborhood of 200,000 pounds of high explosives on some of Germany's most highly prized airports, factories, communications centers and other military objectives.

Captain Insley, however, had time to enjoy the scenery.

"The Alps gave me a real thrill," he said. "I don't think I have seen anything so beautiful."

Decorations Won
He had some close-up views of the Alps as he participated in two bombing raids on Friedrichshafen. He hit Bremen three times, was over the outskirts of Berlin on one excursion, dropped bombs on Munster and hit numerous other of the principal targets in Germany and occupied countries. His bombardier won the Distinguished Flying Cross for the perfection with which he unloaded the plane's cargo of high explosives or the airport at Furth.

Captain Insley wears the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal with three clusters.

"I really enjoy flying a mission," the captain said. "Of course a fellow gets a little scared at times, but I enjoy it."
Insley didn't say so, but we imagine he was a "little scared," the day he made his 25th mission, a bombing raid over Brunswick. Their fighter escort left them on the return trip and they were attacked by more than 100 enemy fighters.

"Our flight leader was right

ahead of me," Insley related. "The enemy planes were coming head on. It seemed to me that the flight leader was taking no evasive action, but was flying level. I dropped down out of the line of fire. After we landed, the flight leader told me, he was dropping too. I certainly must have been going down fast."

Once he came near to a decision which would have put him and his crew out of the war. After reaching his target he estimated that he had only enough fuel for three hours but was faced with a five-hour return trip to his base in England. He debated making a run for Spain, but finally decided to try getting back to England and, by reducing power, just managed to cross the channel before being forced down on the first available airport.

Plane Escapes Bullet

Although participating in 28 combat missions, his plane has never been struck by an enemy bullet. The ship has been hit numerous times by flak and once the bombardier's life was saved by his identification tag which partially deflected a piece of shrapnel which struck his chest. The wounded man spent a month in the hospital. The day following the Brunswick raid, in which the formation was attacked by 100 enemy fighters, Captain Insley's plane was the only one still in flying condition.

A graduate of Roseburg high school with the class of 1940, Insley enlisted in the army air forces Jan. 8, 1942. He received his training at Texas air fields, Corsicana, Perrin and Waco, and went to England in August 1943. He has had more than 200 hours of combat flying, and was serving as a squadron leader and deputy group leader at the time he was granted 30-day leave to visit his parents and other relatives. Following his leave, he will return to England.
