Plywood Research Unit Established By Manufacturers

TACOMA, May 24—(AP)—Sizeable timber stands have been acquired and a \$100,000 research foundation established by northwest Douglas fir plywood manufacturers, it was disclosed at the annual meeting of the Douglas Fir Plywood association here yesterday.

The association included 30 plywood factories in Oregon and Washington.

E. W. Daniels, chairman of the association's management committee and president of the Harbor Plywood corporation of Hoquiam, said the research foundation had been formed as a separate corporation from the existing association laboratory at Tacoma, which will continue. W. M. Dufford, managing director of the association, of Tacoma, said its purpose would be to develop wood products separate and apart from lumber, plywood and pulp.

Dufford added that "plywood manufacturers now own or control in excess of ten billion feet of standing timber whereas prior to 1939 their holdings were negligible."

1944 CCC WOOL PRICES

Prices to be paid by the CCC for domestic wool are in general the ceiling prices less transportation and marketing expenses and a charge of 1 and 1/8 cents per pound to cover the costs of appraisal, storage and interest; but for certain short wools and off-wools, the purchase prices have been adjusted in line with the normal relationship between the values of such qualities and the value of longer and higher quality wool.
