

Biddle Defends Federal Seizure Of Ward's Store

WASHINGTON, May 24—Attorney General Biddle testified today that he believed President Roosevelt was authorized by the War Labor disputes act to seize Montgomery Ward and company's strike-bound Chicago properties, but that even "without regard" to that statute the chief executive has requisitioning authority in war time.

Appearing before a special house committee investigating cited specifically section 3 of the War Labor disputes act, giving the chief executive power to take over property equipped for "manufacture, production or mining."

Acknowledging that "there is room for disagreement on the legal aspects" of the case, Biddle suggested that if congress itself believes Mr. Roosevelt exceeded his authority it should clarify the laws so the chief executive "may be guided accordingly."

"No attorney general in advising the president," he said, "can do more than interpret the law as he sees it, trusting to the courts to correct him if he is wrong and to congress to make any changes in the law which it deems wise."

Biddle asserted that he believed the courts would sustain his ruling, adding "It may be that as a result of these hearings this committee will believe that certain changes should be made in the provisions of the War Labor disputes act."

Amplifying his reference to the President's authority in the absence of a specific statute, the attorney general said this power is essentially the power of requisition, adding it twice had been specifically recognized by the supreme court.

"President Lincoln," he continued, "without express statutory

authority took possession of a Before the passage of the War Labor disputes act and when there was no express statutory authority for doing so, the President, in nine cases, took over industrial facilities whose operations were interrupted or threatened with interruption."

Biddle said also that in the debates preceding passage of the War Labor disputes act it was generally conceded that the President had seizure authority.

BACON! What a joy to have plenty of it available! And you know, bacon has many fine uses for lunch and dinner, in addition to time-honored "bacon for breakfast." Here are some suggestions which I hope you'll try:

BACON AND VEGETABLE PLATE
1 lb. bacon 1/2 cup bacon
4 tomato halves 1 cup milk
1 head cauliflower 1 cup vinegar
Green beans 1/2 cup paprika
Salt and pepper

Broil bacon until evenly crisped. At the same time place tomatoes in the broiling oven, dot with butter or margarine, and heat. Cook cauliflower and green beans separately in boiling salted water. Make Savory Dressing. Mix bacon drippings, add vinegar and paprika. To serve, arrange cauliflower in center of platter and top with Savory Dressing. Alternate green bean bundles and tomato halves around cauliflower. Border with slices of bacon.

BACON CORNMEAL MUFFINS
1 1/2 cups enriched flour, sifted 2 eggs, well beaten
3/4 cup yellow cornmeal 1 cup milk
1 tbsp. baking powder 1/2 cup melted butter
1/2 tsp. salt 6 slices bacon
Salt and pepper

Sift and mix all dry ingredients together. Combine beaten eggs, milk and melted bacon fat, add to dry ingredients with chopped cooked bacon, stirring only enough to dampen flour. Fill greased muffin pans two-thirds full and bake in moderately hot oven (425° F.) about 20 minutes. Makes 8 muffins.

LIMA BEAN & BACON CASSEROLE
2 cups lima beans 1 cup tomatoes
(drain) 1/2 large onion
Salt and pepper 6 slices bacon

Soak lima beans, then simmer until tender. Season with salt, pepper, add tomatoes and finely chopped onion and place in a 2 qt. casserole. Add strips of bacon over the top and bake in moderate oven (350° F.) for 30 minutes. Serves 5 to 6.

BACON-CORN PUDDING
4 strips bacon 1 tbsp. sugar
3 strips bacon fat 1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup yellow cornmeal 1 cup whole egg
1 tsp. salt 1/2 cup white pepper 2 eggs, beaten

Fry bacon crisp, and crumble. Stir flour, salt, white pepper and sugar into bacon fat. Add milk slowly, cooking over low heat until mixture thickens and boils. Stir in corn, beaten eggs and crumbled bacon. Fill 6 greased baking cups, set in pan of hot water and bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 45 minutes. Serves 6.
