While Oakland was winning over Sacramento, 9 to 3, Fanning, one-armed umpire, collapsed on the field following an argument with Manager Camilli of Oakland. He was taken to a hospital where his condition was reported satisfactory. His ailment was diagnosed as a heart attack.
