Redecorating—The Main street entrance and stage lobby of the Valley hotel is being redecorated in blue and white colors this week.

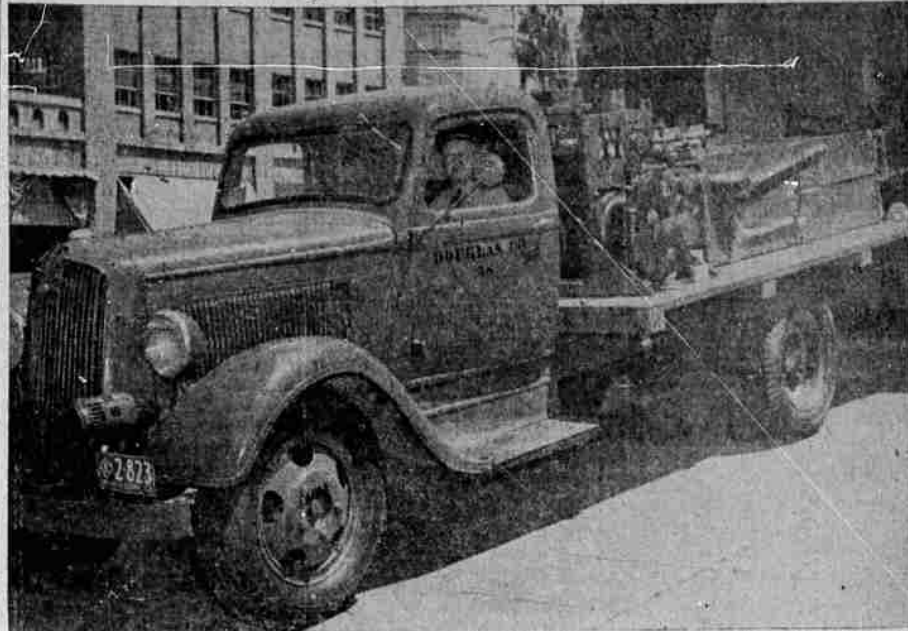

Adapted for Battling Out-of-Town Fires



Pictured above, with City Fire Chief Glenn Taylor at the wheel, is the Civilian Defense fire truck recently acquired here through the cooperation of the federal government, which furnished the equipment; the Douglas county court, who purchased the truck, and the city council, which, through the fire department, mans, operates and maintains it.

The outfit cost about \$2000. The truck is equipped with a separate unit 100 h. p. Chrysler engine which operates a Hale pump capable of pulling 500 gallons of water per minute. Spools of one and one-half and two and one-half inch hose, nozzles, suction hose, ladders, five-gallon pump tanks and standard wrecking instruments complete the equipment. The pump may be supplied directly from water hydrants or any source such as wells, ponds or streams. The unit is particularly adapted to use in areas outside the city fire zone, at adjacent industrial sites, nearby towns or the scene of any conflagration where, according to law, city equipment may not be used.

Beavers Shut Out Hollywood in Last Battle of Series

(By the Associated Press) The Portland Beavers shut out the Hollywood Stars, 8 to 0, in the final game of Sunday's coast league doubleheader to end a series which saw the Stars move up from sixth to fourth place in the league standings as they walloped the Beavers in five of the seven contests at Hollywood.

Federmyer hurled three-hit baseball for the Beavers in winning the second game Sunday after Hollywood had copped the first by a 2 to 1 score. Hollywood won the Saturday game, 7 to 5. The Seattle Rainiers again demonstrated their mastery over the San Francisco Seals by taking the second game of the doubleheader Sunday, 2 to 0, and the series at 4 games to 3. The Seals have lost but two series since the season opened, and both times to Seattle. San Francisco won the opening game Sunday, 4 to 3, to square the series count after Seattle won Saturday's contest by a 11 to 3 score. The Seals held on to second place by two percentage points.

The San Diego Padres split with Los Angeles Sunday, by scores of 3 to 2 and 0 to 2, for a 4 to 3 edge on the series but dropped into the second division, one percentage point behind Hollywood. Los Angeles won Saturday, 4 to 1.

Oakland made a clean sweep of the weekend games with Sacramento, winning Saturday, 9 to 1, and taking the Sunday contests by scores of 6 to 0 and 15 to 2.

Okey J. Collins, 68, a resident of Riddle, died suddenly Saturday as the result of a heart ailment. He had been in poor health, but went Saturday to inspect property located on Wilson creek about four miles from Riddle. When he failed to return at the appointed time, his wife called friends who went with her to the farm cabin, where they found Collins dead.

He was born at Rone, West Virginia, April 15, 1876, and had made his home at Riddle for the past 23 years.

Tulelake Farms to Work Italian War Prisoners

TULELAKE, Calif., May 29.—(AP)—Italian prisoners of war who will be employed on farms of this area will be fed, housed, transported and guarded by the army, Tulelake Growers association reports.

The association, which urged the use of prisoner labor after it was learned Mexican nationals would not be available to help with spring work, will handle the payroll for the workers. Farmers will pay the government 70 cents an hour for each Italian worker and one cent per mile per man for transportation to the fields. The government will allow each Italian 80 cents a day.

Plans for use of German prisoners have been abandoned temporarily, the association said.

Ex-Pearl Harbor Heads May Still Face Charges

WASHINGTON, May 29.—(AP)—Legislation extending for one year the time in which the Pearl Harbor commanders eventually could be tried on charges of dereliction of duty was approved today by the house rules committee.

Under the statute of limitations prosecution normally would be barred after June 7, 1944. The extension proposed by Rep. Short (R-Mo.), "directs" that the court-martial be instituted some time during the next year. It is aimed specifically at Rear Adm. Husband E. Kimmel and Maj. Gen. Walter C. Short, but also includes any other officers and civilians who may have contributed to the success of the Japanese attack Dec. 7, 1943.

Wood-Waste Plant Site At Springfield Chosen

EUGENE, Ore., May 29.—(AP)—War defense plant corporation engineers have approved sites for the proposed alcohol-wood-waste plant in Springfield and the silica sand treating plant here. The \$2,500,000 Springfield plant will be leased to the Willamette Valley Wood Chemical company, the \$75,000 Eugene project to the Silica Products of Oregon, Ltd., Portland.
