

4 From Douglas Candidates For Degrees, U. of O.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, May 27—(special)—Marjorie Elizabeth Ott and Jane Wangerman Kalina, both of Roseburg; Patricia G. Short, Umpqua; and Maryjane Bovingdon, Oakland, are candidates for degrees at the 67th annual commencement of the University of Oregon, to be held June 4, in McArthur court. They are among 350 candidates named late last week.

Miss Ott is applying for a bachelor of science in architecture and allied arts; Miss Kalina, for a bachelor of science in education; Miss Short, for a bachelor of arts in English; and Miss Rees, for a bachelor of arts in music.

Miss Ott was a contributor to Odeon, art show given by students this year, and is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William E. Ott, Roseburg; Miss Short was active in girls' sports, and is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Short, Umpqua; Miss Bovingdon is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James C. Rees, Oakland.

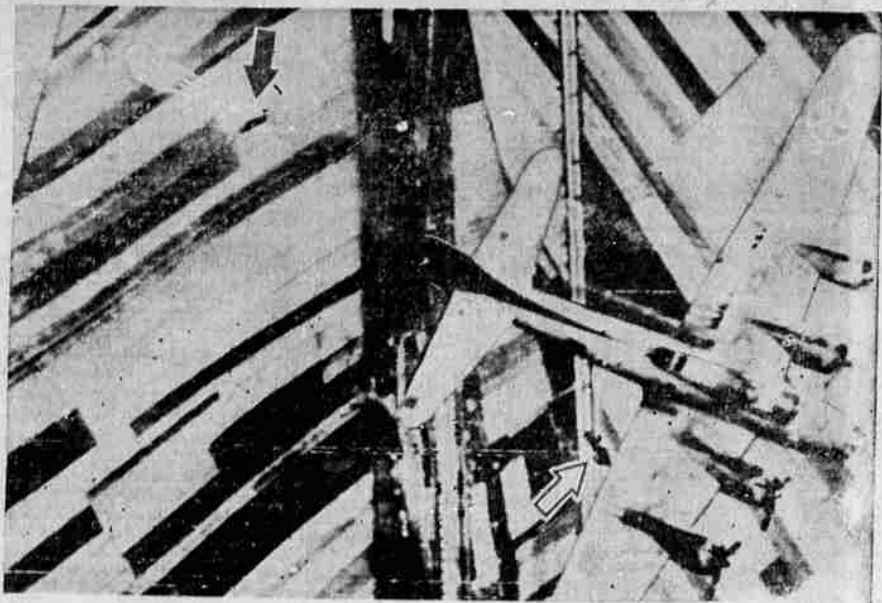
shells with American and Australian naval vessels which covered Saturday's landing. The ships suffered some damage.

Allied bombers splashed 288 tons of explosives on Japanese positions. Nine enemy planes, five of them bombers, were downed by allied fighters and surface vessels' anti-aircraft guns. One of the four Japanese bombers accounted for by the fleet's attack crashed on an escort vessel, damaging the ship and causing casualties among the crew.

Hollandia Mop Up Proceeds
MacArthur described the Blak landings as virtually concluding the allied campaign for New Guinea. The thrust was 200 miles west of Wakde island, which had fallen under the Yankee invasion wave May 18.

Disintegration of Japanese forces in the neighborhood of Hollandia, 110 miles east of the Wakde-Sarmi area, continued with the trapped soldiers of the enemy's 18th army deprived of supplies or reinforcements by the

American invasion there April 22.

MacArthur said American patrols and natives daily reported finding Japanese dead and dying in the jungle backlands; that an additional 453 enemy dead had been counted. One American patrol alone killed 59 Japanese and found more than 300 dead.

Realizing their fate, the enemy's morale has broken and the trapped Japanese "are beginning to disintegrate into straggling groups seeking only food and escape," MacArthur said.

SOUTHEAST ASIA HEAD-QUARTERS, Kandy, Ceylon, May 29—(AP)—American and Chinese troops have penetrated deeper into the main Japanese north Burma base of Myitkyina but some 35 miles to the west near the town of Mogaung British chindits have withdrawn from their positions astride the enemy's communication line from the south, it was announced today.

The chindits had held a position southeast of Mogaung since last March, blocking the Mandalay-Myitkyina railway. A south-east Asia command communique

said that they had retired after five days of heavy fighting with reinforced Japanese units. These airborne troops have been operating behind the Japanese 18th division which, in turn, faces the Chinese in the Mogaung valley. Penetrating into the southern end of Myitkyina, the American and Chinese troops were declared to have cut the Japanese exit in that direction after two days of fighting.

the Polish border. Seven bombers were forced to land in Sweden, Stockholm dispatches said.

The daylight assaults capped a night in which the RAF kept the snowballing air offensive rolling unchecked by assaults on the northwestern French railroad center of Angers, the German chemical city of Ludwigshafen, and other targets on the French coast.

The RAF operations last night, which also included mine laying in enemy waters, cost one British plane.

The railway center of Angers—a new objective—was the main target of the British night bombers. The attack was reported heavy.

Oil Plants Blasted

The largest American aerial armada yet dispatched delivered fiery and explosive blows to a dozen German targets Sunday including five urgently needed synthetic oil plants around Leipzig, Dresden and Magdeburg in the very heart of the central reich, a United States communique said.

Extensive fires and explosions were recorded in fuel factories at Ruhland, Lutzendorf, Merseburg, Magdeburg and Zeltz. The German army tank and armored vehicle plants at Königsborn suffered "heavy and extensive damage" with all principal buildings hit, the communique said.

Other damage was done by the 1,000 bombers and 1,200 convoying fighters at a Junkers aircraft engine factory at Leipzig-Taucha; at Zwickau where rail yards and the airframe were bombed; at the Brandis-Polenz airfield near Leipzig; and at the railroad yards east of Berlin at Frankfurt and at Cologne.

NEW YORK, May 29—(AP)—A man identified by police as Frank Hahn, 52, interrupted a solemn Pentecostal mass at St. Patrick's cathedral yesterday by hurling two eggs at Archbishop Francis J. Spellman. The archbishop was not struck.

Seized by and usher, the man was booked on a disorderly conduct charge and was sent to Bellevue hospital for observation, pending a hearing June 7 in Yorkville court.

Poison Liquor Death of Six Charged to Woman

NEW YORK, May 29—(AP)—Mrs. Sophie Kruisinas, 31, was held without bail today on a charge of homicide following the death of six men in Brooklyn who drank what police believe was poison liquor.

The wife of a candy store proprietor and mother of a five-year-old boy was arraigned before a magistrate in Brooklyn.

Police said Mrs. Kruisinas admitted selling 15 bottles of an alcoholic drink since last Tuesday and reported they had found a 15-gallon tank of denatured alcohol as well as 30 gallons in bottles at the Kruisinas' home.

Allies Battling Nazis 16 Miles From Rome

Daniel de Luce of the A. P. said the roofless, shell-punctured town fell without a hand-to-hand struggle as the allies lunged through fields of crosses bearing American, British and German names. The stench of cordite and the dust of battle hung heavily on the approaches to Rome. Kesselring was trying desperately to scrape up some reserves in north Italy to patch up his shattered Nazi lines. Radio Algiers said the marshal's men were "groggy and reeling" and "disengaging along the whole front."

Lt. Col. Ziegler, commander of the 361st grenadiers opposing the

Eighth army, wrote in his regimental story which fell into the hands of the British:

"Our heavy losses are the token of the hardness of the battle. More than half the men of the third battalion have paid the price for their bravery with their life's blood. In the second battalion losses also have been heavy. The majority are missing, either dead or fallen into English hands, gravely wounded."

Lumber and Sawmill Workers union, AFL, also met in Portland but adjourned until today without taking action on the WLB's ultimatum that wage appeals would not be considered while the estimated 30,000 workers remained idle.

Lone bright spot in the darkening picture was at Yakima, Wash. where J. D. Bronson, manager of the Cascade Lumber company, predicted the mill would reopen today. The mill, engaged in production of ammunition boxes and other materials, employs 600 men, and officials of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers union (AFL) said they had assurances sufficient workers would be on the job to end the shutdown.

On Coos bay, one of Oregon's greatest producing areas, the Coos Bay Lumber company mill, the largest on the bay, was unable to open when too few of its crew of 250 failed to report.

Likewise some smaller mills were down, with several operating almost as usual.

SILVERTON, Ore., May 29—(AP)—AFL employees of the Silver Falls Timber company, who walked out last Thursday, have voted to unload eight carloads of logs and furnish hog fuel to the state tubercular hospital and Cal Pack cannery at Salem to save perishables from spoiling.
