Landon, the 1936 presidential nominee, Senator Robert Taft of Ohio and Senator Warren Austin of Vermont. The resolutions group, made up of two convention delegates from each state, will meet in Chicago one week in advance of the June 26 presidential nominating convention to elect officers and begin hearings on proposed platform plank.

shall be done, and at what time, no one can tell, for no one knows as yet just the manner of the ending of this struggle. But we do know that the principles which govern must be those of justice and fairness to all peoples. When the war shall close we must construct such a peace as will give to the smaller nations a right to live in safety and enjoy their homes and native lands. We as a nation must conduct ourselves toward other nations, and particularly towards the vast numbers of smaller nations, in such a manner that they will have confidence and trust in us and recognize our friendship as genuine.

"At the same time we cannot forget that these principles must be protected and maintained at home, that we may still have the right to be a free people; that we may still have the right of private property, which shall not be taken from us by the dictates of any one, without due process of law."

The speaker urged whole-hearted cooperation in the war effort, particularly through purchase of war bonds and acceptance of personal responsibility, so that "our boys and girls, when they return to the chairs now vacant, will find a stronger and better country than when they went away."

Natives of Vienna Nab Fugitive Nazi Prisoner

PORTLAND, Ore., May 30.—(AP)—Two natives of Vienna were credited by police today with the capture of a German prisoner of war escapee from Fort Lewis, Wash.

Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Parker, now naturalized Americans, became suspicious of his poor English, trapped him into speaking German and then persuaded him to give himself up.

Police identified the prisoner as Adolf G. Boddenberg, 24, who was captured by the British at El Alamein. They said he told them he was headed for Mexico and that he possessed a handgun containing a few cans of K ration, a few silver coins and a driver's license issued to Matt Williams, Macon Miss.

Germans in Last Ditch Stand to Save Rome

plane plants in Austria, Poland and central Germany destroyed 168 Nazi interceptors at the cost of 55 bombers and 25 lesser planes. The Russians bombed German airbases in Romania and said they destroyed or damaged 60 more enemy planes.

The Germans raided southern England for the second night in a row, one wave bombing a southwest shore community while other planes cruised along the coast, evidently trying to spot invasion preparations. The Nazis, doubling their bombing score of the night before, hit two hotels. Five dead and several seriously injured persons were brought out during the night, and rescuers still dug for others today.

Anti-Nazis Busy A neutral said the Germans in western Europe had dispersed thousands of small military units over France to cope with invading air troops. If so, this achieves one of the principal objectives of that arm of Gen. Eisenhower's masses.

Gunfire and star shells signaled night action in the Dover straits. Radio Moscow said the Germans had uncovered an anti-Nazi organization in Denmark including a group of Nazi officers and police officials.

Bankers Assn. Planning Longer Loan Periods

PORTLAND, May 29.—(AP)—Banks would make loans for periods up to six years under a post-war plan now being worked out by the American Bankers Association, President A. Lee Wiggins of Hartsville, S. C., said today.

Banks that have made only short-term loans in the past realize that in the reconversion period business men will need credit over longer periods, Wiggins said in an interview.

The association also plans to set up supplementary pools of credit for small banks to make available sums in excess of their legal lending limit, Wiggins said.

Crashes in Washington Kill Two Military Fliers

EPHRATA, Wash., May 25.—(AP)—Lt. Lex M. Belyeu, 21, of Quincy, Fla., was killed yesterday when his plane, a P-39 Aircobra, crashed while on a combat training flight 20 miles north of here. Col. Henry G. Thorne, Jr., commanding officer of the Ephrata army air base, said today.

MOSES LAKE, Wash., May 25.—(AP)—Second Lt. Morton Hecker, Fourth air force pilot, of New York, was instantly killed when his P-39 fighter plane crashed eight miles southwest of Moses lake last night, the air base public relations office reported this morning.
