Nazis Cling to Last Line Outside of Rome

nazis said 78 of 200 Fifth army tanks were smashed. The enemy said American troops were being buried beneath ruins of buildings which nazi shock troops were blowing up in Bellettri. "The battle south of Rome seems nearing its climax," the report added.

Mighty Blow Needed. The enemy was reported to have thrown all available troops into an all-out effort to hold his last fortress wall before Rome—at least until the troops withdrawing in the face of the Eighth army can make good their escape.

It is now apparent that months were taken in preparation of this steel and stone shield barring the way to the Eternal city. Unofficial opinion was expressed that only a mighty drive would split it open.

Battlefront advices said the Hermann Goering motorized division had been built up to full strength and that artillerymen and service troops had been thrust into the line as infantry, while German Marshal Kesselring sought to hold the Fifth army pressure.

Various Cheeses Placed Under Specific Prices

WASHINGTON, May 31—(AP)—The OPA yesterday announced specific cents-per-pound ceilings for various cheeses, an action it said will save consumers more than \$2,000,000 annually.

Effective June 5, the maximums apply to blue, Gorgonzola and five groups of Italian-type cheese including varieties classed as Provolone, Parmesan, Monte and Modena, soft Asiago and Romano, as well as Monterey and high moisture (California) jack cheese.

The action removes these cheeses from current frozen prices established at the September 28-October 2, 1942, level to bring prices into balance with cheddar cheese prices, OPA said. Standards of identity for each cheese group also are established by the orders.

Phony Gas Stamp Peddler Trapped

TACOMA, May 31—(AP)—Possibility that a ring specializing in the bootleg sale of spuriously printed "C" gasoline ration stamps is operating here and openly making sales in downtown cigar stores and taverns, was admitted by police today after the arrest of the alleged salesman here yesterday.

In the city jail, according to Detective Captain William E. Farrar, is Edward C. Sheets, 36, Tacoma, who, police said, made the mistake Tuesday of making two sales to two OPA investigators sent here from Seattle.

Investigator F. A. Gaskill contacted Sheets in the forenoon, police said and purchased a block of eight connected spurious "C" tickets for \$6, and was informed that single tickets would sell for \$1 each. Gaskill pocketed the tickets and arranged for a "friend" to make a purchase in the afternoon.

The second investigator, S. C. Clark met Sheets in a downtown cigar store and also made a \$6 purchase of the tickets. City police were called and the salesman was arrested.
