Oregon Bankers Retain Tillotson as President

PORTLAND, May 30—(AP)—Mitchell Tillotson, Klamath Falls, will continue as head of the Oregon Bankers association.

Tillotson, who was elevated to the presidency several months ago upon the resignation of L. E. Cable, was re-elected to the position yesterday at a wartime conference of the association here. Tillotson is manager of the Klamath Falls branch of the First National bank of Portland.

The association approved the ABA's plan for cooperation in providing long-term credit for postwar industry.

A. L. M. Wiggins, Hartsville, S. C., president of the ABA, said bankers are creating credit pools to help the small business man in the reconstruction period.

U. S. War Casualties Reach Total of 206,227

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—the latest report on American battle casualties places them at 206,227, of which 161,113 are army personnel and 45,114 navy.

Any casualties through May 6 were: 28,059 killed, an increase of 762 from a previous report covering the period through April 28; 65,779 wounded, an increase of 1,458; 35,496 missing, an increase of 1,781; 31,779 prisoners, an increase of 436.

Navy casualties: 19,546 dead, an increase of 325 from a May 11 report; 12,089 wounded, an increase of 19; 9,026 missing, a decrease of 908; (probably resulting chiefly from transfer of names to dead or wounded categories); 4,453 prisoners, unchanged.

Firemen to Get Instructions at Demonstrations

Demonstrations tonight and Friday by the Roseburg fire department, which will take the newly installed civil defense, mutual-aid engine to Sutherland, Oakland, Myrtle Creek and Canyonville, will provide Roseburg firemen with knowledge of fire-fighting facilities in each of the towns to be visited. Glenn H. Taylor, fire chief, reported today.

The truck is to be shown at Sutherland between 7 and 7:45 o'clock tonight, and will go to Oakland for demonstrations from 8 to 8:45 Friday night the equipment will be shown at Myrtle Creek, starting at 9 o'clock, and at Canyonville at 8 o'clock.

In addition to acquainting the departments in each of the towns with the performance of the engine and steps to be taken prior to arrival in the event of emergency, Roseburg firemen will inspect equipment at each place and will familiarize themselves with water facilities.

The new engine includes a 500-gallon pump, powered by a Chrysler motor furnished, complete with hose, ladders, nozzles and other accessories, by the federal civilian defense department, and mounted upon a truck furnished by the county court. The equipment will be available to fight fire only in industrial or other plants directly connected with the war effort.

Anderson, Rio Vista, Corriedale breeder and president, Solano Wool Growers Association had his wool appraised at Dixon by the Pacific Fur and Wool Company of Sacramento; Bill Berman, president, and through Dr. Almeida of Dixon, The Boston price was 66.08c; all charges 5.42c, so that the net f. o. b. ranch was 60.66c per pound. There were 7678 pounds in the lot, including 3 sacks of lambs wool totaling around 1000 lbs. This latter will be scoured and then appraised.
