Type of Man U. S. Needs Described By Rickenbacker

KANSAS CITY, May 31—(AP)—Capt. Eddie Rickenbacker believes "America needs a man."

The World War I ace described this man to newsmen as one "who will add a fifth freedom to the Atlantic charter—the freedom of Opportunity."

"America needs a man," he said, "who has convictions, with courage to put his convictions into action; a man who will not cater to or coddle minorities or pressure groups; a man who will think in terms of the welfare of the great American majority; who will recommend labor laws to protect the American laboring men and women from racketeering and false leadership; a man who will respect states' rights."

"America needs a man who will reduce bureaucracy to the minimum and who will reduce and keep government expense within the earning power of the people."

"America needs a man who will think in terms of America first in order that America will last. We need a man who will cooperate with other peoples of the world to insure a lasting peace but not at the expense of the American people alone; a man who believes in free enterprise and our form of government."

"The American people need a man who will go to the American people with a promise of legislation for their approval limiting the presidential term to six years—or two terms of four years each—or traditional and God-given heritage. A man who will add the fifth freedom to the Atlantic charter—the freedom of opportunity."

"With a fifth freedom we are placing a foundation under the four sides of the Atlantic charter, permitting it to endure and weather the storms of ages as have the pyramids that were built centuries ago."

"That is what I think is needed for the welfare of the country. We need a man."

Aircraft Warning Service in Oregon Brought to End

PORTLAND May 31—(AP)—Placing of the army's aircraft warning corps and ground observer corps on an inactive status today will bring an end to the work of some 4,000 men and women in the Portland air region.

Letters from Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson and Maj. Gen. William E. Lynd, commanding general of the Fourth air force, to all members of both civilian corps, notified them their services will not longer be required except in case of an unexpected emergency.

Secretary Stimson said the system was being changed to make more men and equipment available for combat duty.

"It is hoped," said General Lynd "that you will feel inclined to form reserve groups, consisting of personnel now serving on the observation posts or in the filter centers, for the continuance of friendly relations and to form a nucleus of trained aircraft warning service personnel so that in the event of an unforeseen emergency this command may count on you to resume operations."

Volunteer workers have donated an estimated 1,000,000 hours of their time to war activities since the Pearl Harbor attack. During the peak of operations, some 15,000 volunteers were enrolled in ground observer corps and filter centers in the Portland region. Still on duty are 580 women volunteers in the Portland information center, another 275 at the Eugene filter center. About 1600 ground observers are on an alert status in the combined Eugene and Roseburg areas, another 1152 in the Portland area.
