Parole Granted In Larceny Case

Parole from a sentence of 60 days in the county jail was granted by Justice of the Peace Thomas Hartfield to James A. Walls, 28, Tenmile, who pleaded guilty to a charge of larceny, the judge reported. The complaint, Hartfield said, accused Walls of the theft of a fire extinguisher, several quarts of oil and other articles from the Shell Service station at Stephens and Oak streets, Roseburg. Walls, Hartfield stated, is a recently returned soldier bearing a discharge for physical disability, and because of his condition the court was lenient in imposing sentence.

A fine of \$50 was imposed on Vera L. Smith, charged with being drunk in a public place. It was her second appearance for drunkenness, Hartfield said. She pleaded guilty and was arranging payment of the fine, the court reported.

Traffic fines reported paid included Vernon Lester Owen, \$10, no clearance lights; A. W. Mitchell \$10, no operator's license; Merton H. Shook, \$10, failure to stop at a through highway.

supplying about 75 per cent of the market continued.

There also was no immediate indication of a settlement of controversy which slowed production at the American Steel and Wire company plant at Worcester, Mass. About 3,600 workers were away from their jobs, apparently not heeding a plea by CIO union leaders to return to work.

Textile Workers Quit

In Danville, Va., 2,500 textile workers were idle, some in a protest strike, but the majority because of a shortage of yarn. At the Riverside and Dan River cotton mills, white spinners engaged in an unauthorized strike in protest against employment of negroes.

At Worcester, Mass., steel workers at the American Steel and Wire company remained out in the fourth day of what union leaders said was an unauthorized strike. The company said about 3,600 employees were affected.

All but nine of the Tampa (Fla.) Electric company's 100 street cars were out of service while about 175 AFL conductors, shopmen and linemen stayed off duty and demanded a signed contract. Extra bus runs handled most of the riders who normally used trolleys.

against such enemy strongholds as dugouts, concrete pillboxes, and anti-tank gun emplacements. The enemy had concentrated self-propelled artillery east of shattered Lanuvio.

Resistance Still Stubborn British troops nearer the coast advanced astride a road north of Ardea, but the extent of their gains was not disclosed. They en-

countered strong machinegun and artillery fire.

Nazi Marshal Kesselring continued to increase his defensive forces in the Valmontone area to keep highway 6 open for German remnants fleeing from the lower battle sectors. It was officially announced that the allies made some gains in that area despite the stubborn resistance.

In what was described as the largest close-cooperation job since the large-scale attack on Cassino, allied bombers yesterday supported the battle for Rome by raiding heavy troops concentrations in the Lake Albano area, near Frascati and between Lanuvio and Velletri.

Other allied aircraft bombed an enemy concentration near Subiaco on the German northern withdrawal route east of Rome.

The allied airforce lost 14 bombers and nine other craft in yesterday's attacks, including raids against the Romanian oil field of Ploesti and objectives in Yugoslavia. Forty-three enemy planes were destroyed.

land New Zealand, yesterday. Halsey, who is retiring as allied commander of naval forces in the south Pacific, said in that theater, including Bougainville, the Japanese now have only about 15,000 men with no more than 2,000 of them effective.

Halsey said that 19 months ago he himself had "only a shoe-string, but now this has grown to a large-sized boot," and recalled that after the battle of the Solomons Nov. 13, 1942, he had available just one damaged carrier, one battleship, one cruiser and a very few destroyers.

"The Jap is really a small man and can easily be dislodged with our big boot," he said.

EVERYBODY LIKES FRESH BERRY JAM

Save Sugar and Berries with This Easy Recipe

6 Cups Ground Berries (Any Variety) 8 1/2 Cups Sugar 1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash, stem and grind 3 quarts fully ripe berries, or crush completely one layer at a time so that each berry is reduced to pulp. Measure exactly 6 level cups crushed berries. (add water to fill out last cup, if necessary), into a large kettle. Add M.C.P. Pectin, stir well and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), mix well and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars, allowing 1/2-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin. (NOTE: For Strawberry Jam, add 1/4 cup lemon juice to each 6 cups crushed berries.)

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN: To the legal voters and taxpayers of the City of Roseburg, Douglas County, Oregon; That the Common Council of said City, will at its regular meeting to be held in the Council Chamber in said City at 7:30 p. m., Monday, June 19th, 1944, consider the adoption of an ordinance for the purpose of levying a general city tax in accordance with the laws of the State of Oregon; and at that time all legal voters and taxpayers interested will be given an opportunity to be heard upon the Budget heretofore adopted by the Budget Committee of the City of Roseburg, and hereinafter set forth, and objections, if any, will be received by the Common Council at that time.
