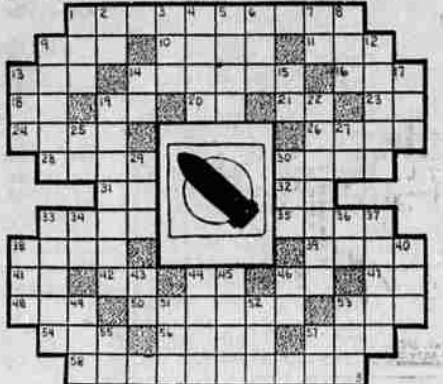
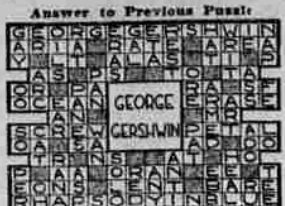

Teacher Vacancies Reduced to Three

Only three vacancies now exist in the teaching staff for the 1944-45 school year, Walter V. Dennis, who is to serve during the ensuing year as city school superintendent, reported today. Numerous applications are on file from which to make selections to fill the remaining vacancies, Dennis stated, but contracts will not be issued until qualifications of each applicant have been thoroughly studied. Mr. Dennis, superintendent at the schools at Clatskanie, was in Roseburg briefly today, returning to Salem to attend to matters pertaining to the school system. He plans to return to Roseburg in about two weeks and will make his home here soon after the first of July.

Photo Requirement Halts Taxicab Service

PORTLAND, Ore., June 2 — (AP)—Taxicab service was halted in Portland today in the climax of a long-standing dispute over a city ordinance requiring drivers to file their photographs at police headquarters. Cabs began disappearing from the streets about midnight, stranding citizens who depend upon taxis for transportation to suburbs not served by Owl streetcars.

The tie-up occurred after municipal Judge J. J. Quillin warned drivers they would be sentenced to jail terms if arrested a second time for driving without a 1944 permit. Most drivers, in protest against the photograph-filing ordinance, have not obtained permits; and John H. Repp, Jr., was fined \$18 on that charge yesterday.

May Rainfall in Local Area Below Normal

Despite precipitation on 14 of the 31 days of May, the total rainfall for the month was below normal, according to the monthly summary compiled by J. C. McCallister, meteorologist in charge of the Roseburg station of the U. S. weather bureau.

Rainfall for the month totaled 1.67 inches as compared with a normal of 1.93 inches. The accumulated deficiency, measured since Jan. 1, 1944 now totals 3.99 inches, while the deficiency since Sept. 1, 1943, is 7.93 inches. Temperature for the month was slightly above normal, with a maximum of 90 degrees on the date of May 3, and a minimum of 38 degrees, May 2.

Mrs. Lucretia Barnum, Native of Douglas, Dies

Mrs. Lucretia Elliff Barnum, 76, died today at San Francisco, according to word received by her niece and nephew, Miss Bess and Huron Clough, Canyonville. She was born near Glendale, a daughter of the late Hary Elliff, and leaves a sister, Mrs. Celia Langenberg, San Francisco, and a brother, George G. Elliff, Weaverville, Calif.

The body is to be brought to Roseburg and funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Monday at Canyonville, conducted by the Rev. C. A. Edwards, through arrangements by the Roseburg Undertaking company.

Oregon's Barber Control Law Upheld by Court

PORTLAND, June 2 — (AP)—The cut-rate shave and haircut is out in the Oregon barber industry, a circuit court ruling indicated today.

Judge Alfred Dobson upheld constitutionality of a 1943 law empowering the state board of barber examiners to regulate and control the barber business. Earl LaForge brought suit testing the law which permits the board to set barber prices.

Special Session Asked To Amend Voters' Law

PORTLAND, June 2 — (AP)—Walter J. Pearson, Portland, democratic nominee for the state senate, has asked Governor Snell to call a special session of the legislature to amend the absent voters' law.

Pearson asserted that from 10,000 to 15,000 applications for absentee ballots were made by members of the armed forces prior to the state primaries, but only about 5000 received ballots.

Drunk Driver Faces Loss Of Permit Rest of Life

PORTLAND, June 2 — (AP)—Lifetime revocation of driving privileges was recommended by Municipal Judge J. J. Quillin when he fined Percy T. Ainge, Portland, \$1,000 and sentenced him to a year in jail on a drunken driving charge.

The arresting officer said Ainge drove recklessly. Ainge filed notice of appeal.

Australia Denies Permit To American Publisher

MELBOURNE, June 2 — (AP)—Customs Minister Keane announced today the federal Australian government had refused the Australian agent of Col. Robert R. McCormick, owner of the Chicago Tribune, permission to publish an edition of the Tribune in Australia for U. S. troops.

Pipeline Question in "Iffy" Stage, F. R. Says

WASHINGTON, June 2 — (AP)—President Roosevelt said today that the question of an American-built oil pipeline in the Mediterranean area is in the "iffy" stage and added no one knows whether there will be a pipeline.

Secretary of the Interior Ickes announced last winter that the United States would construct a pipeline in the near east to transport oil from an oil concession owned by an American company.

The president said today that not only does no one know if there will be a pipeline but no one can say who will pay for it. A reporter asked the president if his remark meant that the oil pipeline situation had gone backward. The president replied only that conferences between this country and Great Britain on the near eastern oil situation are still going on.

U. S. Airplane Output Far Exceeds Goal

WASHINGTON, June 2 — (AP)—President Roosevelt said today the United States has produced more than 175,000 airplanes in about three years.

In making public the report from the Foreign Economic Administration, Mr. Roosevelt recalled that some doubting Thomases scoffed when he told congress before the war that the administration's goal was to produce 50,000 planes a year.

The goal, he said, has been exceeded tremendously. Between March 1941, when the lend-lease act was passed and April 1 this year, more than 33,000 planes have been sent to the fighting forces of the other united nations.

Draft Status Review For Soldier Ordered

TACOMA, June 2 — (AP)—A writ of habeas corpus ordering the army to release Pvt. John Gale Swatzka of Tangent, Ore., so he can return to his draft board for a review of his draft status was ordered by Federal Judge Charles H. Leavy yesterday.

The suit was instituted by the soldier's father, John H. Swatzka, who said the youth was essential to operation of the family farm which the parents alleged they were too old to operate.

Blast of Ammunition Train Shatters Depot

LONDON, June 2 — (AP)—An ammunition train exploded today in an East Anglia market town, lifting roofs from adjacent houses, turning the railroad station into a shambles, and injuring a number of persons.

The fireman of the train was killed. The train, station and nearby buildings caught fire, but whether any fatalities occurred was not immediately known.

Sactos Win From Padres in Baffest

(By the Associated Press) The San Diego Padres fattened their batting averages with 15 hits off Pitcher Le Gault of Sacramento but lost a Coast league swatfest to the last-place Solons last night, 13 to 8.

Le Gault went the route, surviving a sixth-inning Padre splurge of seven consecutive singles which started after two men were out and scored five runs. Sacramento was leading 12 to 2 when the Padres had their big inning. The Solons gathered 13 hits off three Padre hurlers. The San Francisco Seals defeated Los Angeles, 3 to 1, behind the six-hit pitching of Harrell and climbed to within striking distance of the leading Portland and Seattle clubs, who were idle because of rain for the second straight night. The Seals are now a game behind Seattle and half a game behind Portland. Portland and Seattle will play a doubleheader tonight in an effort to make up lost time.

A clean single by Pinch Hitter Herrera with the bases loaded in the twelfth inning gave the Oakland Acons a 2 to 1 victory over Hollywood.
