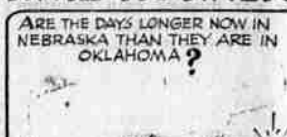

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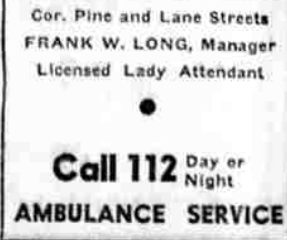
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## Time Extension in Pearl Harbor Case Is Recommended

WASHINGTON, June 1—(AP)

The senate judiciary committee recommended today that the time for filing charges against persons responsible for the military debacle at Pearl Harbor be extended a full year from next Wednesday and that the army and navy proceed "forthwith" with investigations.

Senator Chandler (D-Ky.) said the practical effect of the resolution, if approved by congress, would be to delay possible court-martial proceedings against Rear Admiral Husband E. Kimmell and Maj. Gen. Walter C. Short until after the war.

Acting Chairman Hatch (D-N. M.) told reporters the navy already had an investigation underway and that Lt. Gen. Joseph T. McNarney, deputy army chief of staff, ordered a military investigation begun today.

The committee eliminated a section of the original resolution offered by Senator Ferguson (R-Mich.) which would have directed the secretaries of the war and navy to institute court-martial proceedings "as soon as possible," and substituted this language: "The secretary of war and the secretary of the navy are severally directed to proceed forthwith with an investigation into the facts surrounding the (Pearl Harbor) catastrophe . . . and thereafter in their discretion to commence such proceedings against such persons as the facts may justify."
