Taxicab Operators Here Form Joint Operation Plan

William Moran and George E. Marsters, Roseburg cab operators, have formed a joint operation plan to assure adequate wartime service to Roseburg patrons under present limitation of gasoline, rubber and equipment. It was revealed today by the Office of Defense Transportation.

The plan was voluntarily drawn up by the operators and approved by the ODT, Donald Call, Medford district manager of the division of motor transport explained. He said that the plan calls for utilization of a central cab stand and call-in from outlying areas to build up full cab loads, and the elimination of cab cruising to save tires, gasoline and equipment.

The ODT representative praised the cab operators for their "sincere interest in maintaining adequate wartime transportation."

He declared "the major responsibility of the ODT is to aid civilians in the provision of adequate transportation services during the present war emergency and applies to the movement of goods and property as well as persons. At the same time this must be accomplished with limited materials, equipment and manpower. Provident utilization and conservation of transportation resources as planned by these operators will definitely aid the community and the war effort."

Ibarra Quits Exile to Again Govern Ecuador

QUITO, Ecuador, June 1.—(AP)—Called back from exile in Colombia, Jose Ibarra took over the leadership last night of a revolutionary government of Ecuador and at once named a cabinet to assist him.

Even before Ibarra, a former president, took the helm the provisional regime, which ousted President Del Rio in a bloody one-day revolution Monday, had issued a decree restoring opponents' privileges.

Aid Sought in Locating Three Draft Registrants

The Douglas county selective service board today asked assistance in locating three registrants whose present whereabouts are unknown. The men apparently have moved from former addresses without notifying the board and are subject to severe penalties as delinquents unless located, Percy Croft, chairman, reported.

The men sought are Fred Smith, 43, registered from Dellwood, Ore.; John W. Phillips, 45, registered from Reedsport, and Mannie V. Andrews, 40, registered from Reedsport.

The selective service board is very appreciative of assistance given in locating men who have failed to give notice of change in address, Croft said. The board is required to certify registrants who go unlocated to the U. S. attorney as delinquents, whereupon they become subject to penalties. Recent publication of men sought brought assistance which resulted in two being located, and their names removed from the delinquent list, although neither has been inducted.

Dr. Ernest Jaqua Given Baruch Research Post

DR. ERNEST JAQUA, 41, NEW YORK, May 31.—(AP)—Dr. Ernest Jaqua, Eugene, Ore., former president of Scripps college, has been appointed educa-

tional director of the Baruch committee on physical medicine, the organization announced today.

The committee was established through a \$1,100,000 endowment by Bernard M. Baruch to further the study of the use of physical procedures and facilities in the care of the sick.

Dr. Jaqua was also appointed secretary of the scientific advisory committee, and to the committee on war and postwar physical rehabilitation and reconditioning.

Liquor Bonus in Oregon Continued During June

Regular rationing—a quart of whiskey and a fifth of brandy monthly—remains unchanged. Other distilled liquors are unrationed, but purchasers are restricted to one bottle at a time.

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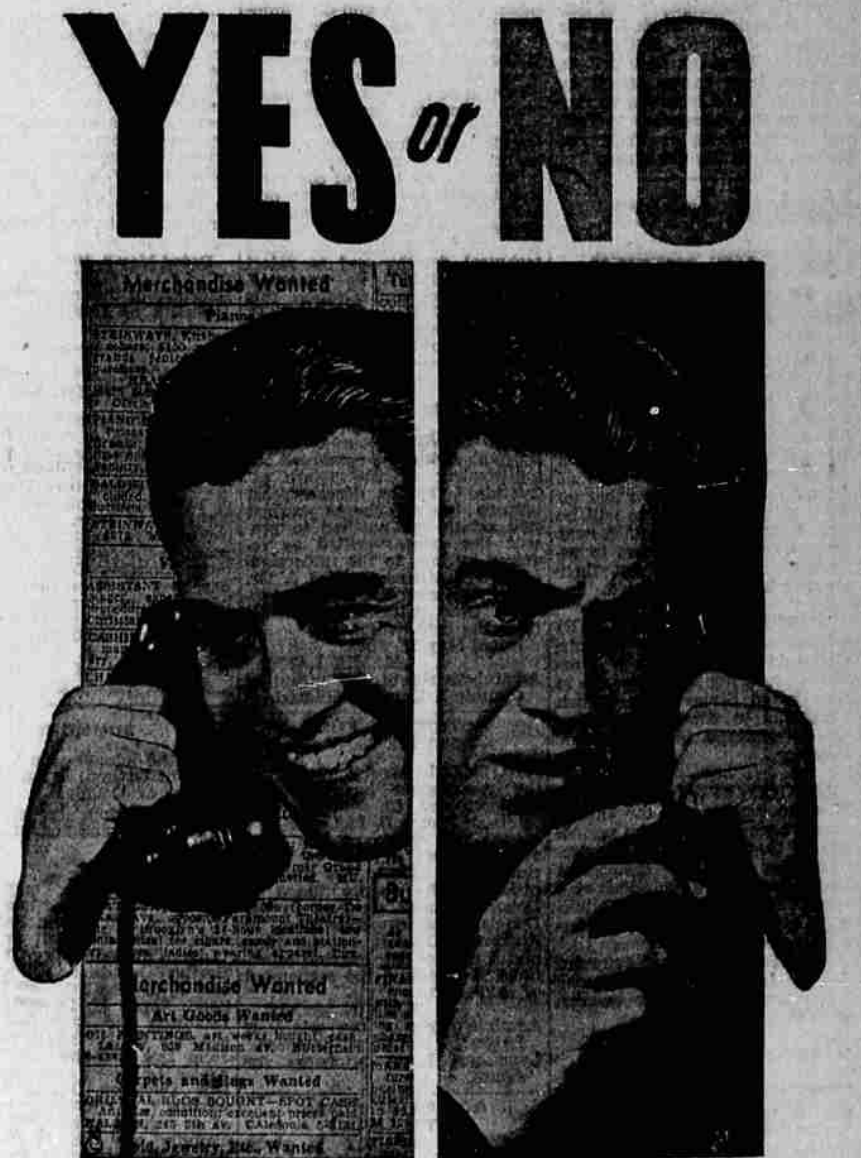
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
