Bitter Battle Now Raging in Alban Hills

U. S., Britain Place On
Foe Responsibility for
Sparing Italy's Capital

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Naples, June 3.—(AP)—Allied forces have "broken through enemy positions south of Rome in many places," and now hold most of the Alban hills dominating the approaches to Rome, headquarters announced to night.

At the same time the Eighth army attacking through the Sacco valley to the southeast captured Anagni, seven miles northwest of Ferentino, and a mile and a half above the Via Cassilina, allied forces of the two main armies are driving toward a junction on the famed highway.

Today's allied communiqué disclosed the Germans were resisting bitterly in the Alban hills defense line below Rome. "Although the towns of Velletri and Valmontone have now been taken by troops of the Fifth army after heavy fighting, the enemy's defense positions in this sector have not yet been broken," the communiqué said. "The penetration into the enemy's position north of Velletri has however been enlarged. The enemy's defenses are in considerable depth and firm resistance is being encountered."

As the allies pressed their drive to trap and destroy German military forces in Italy, the U. S. and British governments put on the Nazis today the responsibility of sparing Rome. The command in Naples announced the allies "will only take military action against Rome in so far as the Germans use the city, railways and roads for their military purposes."

The announcement followed Pope Pius' declaration yesterday that "whoever dared raise a hand" against the Eternal City "would be guilty of matricide."

"If the Germans choose to defend Rome the allies will be obligated to take appropriate military measures to effect them," the U. S.-British announcement said. "It therefore is the sincere hope of his majesty's government and the United States government that the enemy will not make such an ill-considered choice."

The Berlin radio quoted a German foreign office spokesman as saying:

Kidnaper Leaves Seattle Child at Distant Doorstep

SEATTLE, June 3.—(AP)—In what police described as "a thwarted kidnaping," 5-year-old Florence (Susie) Marks, navy doctor's daughter, early today was carried down a 16-foot ladder from her bedroom window and abandoned, huddled in a blanket from her bed, on a doorstep 14 blocks away.

Dr. Robert F. Ballard, interne at the King county Harborview hospital, examined the child and reported she had not been harmed, as had been feared by Police Capt. William Feek, in charge of the case.

Arthur L. Chaffee, assistant chief of police, said he believed the abductor was a degenerate alley prowler who became frightened and abandoned the child.

The federal bureau of investigation was notified by Captain Feek but declined to enter the case as not being within its jurisdiction.

The police captain said the girl's parents, Lt. Comdr. and Mrs. Jacob Marks, reported at 2:45 a. m. that Florence was missing from her bedroom and a ladder had been found leading into a second story window of the Marks house.

Forty-five minutes later, Feek said, Mrs. Ethel Smart telephoned police that the girl, clinging to a blanket, had rung her doorbell. Mrs. Smart lives 14 blocks from the Marks residence.

Accused of supplying wine to a minor girl, Edward W. Fugate, 23, Oakland, pleaded guilty in the Roseburg justice court today and was fined \$200 and sentenced to 30 days in jail, Judge Thomas Hartfiel reported.

Fraud in Evading Draft Charged To 15 Under Arrest

BALTIMORE, June 3.—(AP)—The FBI arrested 14 men and one woman today, accusing them of evading the draft or assisting inductees to feign mental ailments in order to obtain deferments.

John W. Vincent, special agent in charge of the Baltimore FBI office, said those arrested included a navy petty officer and two army non-commissioned officers assigned to the Fifth regiment armory induction station.

Vincent said that amounts ranging from \$150 to \$500 had been paid for help in obtaining psycho-neurotic rejections, entitling inductees to 4-F classification.

Four civilians were accused of counseling inductees to evade the draft, or with acting as intermediaries between inductees and the three military representatives at the Fifth regiment armory. The other defendants, all former inductees, were charged with draft evasion.

All were ordered held by a U. S. commissioner in a total of \$29,500 bail for hearing June 13. The FBI chief said inductees were instructed not only in feigning mental illness, but also poor hearing, heart conditions, and other ailments.

Under the selective service act, those held, if convicted, are liable to a maximum penalty of five years in prison or a \$10,000 fine, or both.

Escaped German War Prisoner Gives Self Up

PORTLAND, Ore., June 3.—(AP)—Hungry, cold and suffering from a leg injury, one of two German prisoners of war who escaped from Fort Lewis, Wash., Sunday gave himself up at Rainier, Ore., yesterday, the Portland FBI office announced.

Hans Koerber, 21, who once escaped from an internment camp at North Camp Hood, Texas, limped into a cafe and in broken English told the proprietor to call police.

Koerber would give no information other than that he fled Sunday with a fellow prisoner, Rolf Z. Teschgang, 23, and had crossed the Columbia river via the Longview bridge yesterday.

He was not in his war prisoner's garb, but was wearing a checked blazer, khaki trousers, light shirt and knit sweater. He carried a small shaving kit.



Invasion Coast Wall, Nazi Rail Systems Bombed

LONDON, June 3.—(AP)—U. S. bombers struck twice at Nazi coastal fortifications in the Pas-de-Calais and Boulogne areas of France today, carrying on the non-stop aerial assault of Europe now under intensified pressure after the shuttle raid to Russian bases.

Flying two missions from Britain, a force of 250 flying fortresses and Liberators with equal strong escort hit coastal emplacements in the morning, and similar fleets roared back in the afternoon to the same area.

These west wall fortifications were hit Friday in their heaviest daylight poundings of the war, and 500 RAF bombers attacked the west wall defenses and crumbling German rail facilities last night.

The daylight attacks sent the air offensive into its 16th day. The RAF night bomber fleet dealt a quick follow-up drubbing to German defenses along the Channel coast and again attacked the great Trappes railway yards on the outskirts of Paris.

A side force of RAF Mosquitoes attacked the chemical center of Leverkusen in Germany near Cologne, a frequent target of recent attacks, and other formations laid mines in enemy waters.

Seventeen British planes were missing from the night operations and at least seven German fighters were shot down, the air ministry announced.

SHUTTLE RAIDING OF GERMAN TARGETS MARKS ESTABLISHMENT OF U. S. AIR BASES IN RUSSIA

Assault Link With Red Air Force Forged

Celebration Follows
Bombing of Romania
In Sweep From Italy

EASTERN COMMAND, U. S. STRATEGIC AIR FORCE, somewhere in Russia, June 3.—(AP)—Formations of American Flying Fortresses and Mustang fighter escorts have landed at secretly-prepared American bases in Russia after bombing Romanian targets, accomplishing the first time and establishing joint offensive operations with the red air force.

The historic operation, completed yesterday, was disclosed to be the fruition of a long-range American-Russian-British air plan through which the three powers, in intimate collaboration, brought the most far-flung portions of the Nazi domain under precision bombing.

(All indications were that the shuttle bombing was launched from bases in Italy. A special communiqué issued by the supreme allied command in the Mediterranean Saturday morning—several hours after full accounts had come from Russia—said that "a force of allied strategic bombers and fighters attacked enemy targets in Romania yesterday and proceeded to Russian bases.")

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In the Day's News

THE battle of Italy grinds on. We take heights dominating Valmontone, and can now SHOOT DOWN on the Germans there. We have apparently taken Velletri, thus widening the base of our attack and enabling us to use more force.

It seems plain, however, that Kesselring is pouring his troops back through the jaw of the trap he is holding open at Valmontone. His rear guards are retiring rapidly before the British 8th army coming up from the south-east.

The speed of his retirement before the British leads us to believe that he is getting a lot of his troops out.

WATCH the fighting at Valmontone. If we SHOULD break through there suddenly we might still trap and demoralize a gratifying number of Germans.

WE'RE fighting now in fairly plain sight of Rome, but taking Rome isn't as important as demoralizing Kesselring's armies. Rome is full of propaganda dynamite, and we're probably wondering right now what to do if we HAVE to attack it.

THE German push in Romania was apparently on a rather considerable scale. The Russians say that in two days there they knocked out 122 German tanks and shot down 164 German planes.

That's no mere skirmish.

WORRY is rising in the Balkans.

War Loan Quotas Set for Douglas Communities Call For \$1,124,000 Grand Total

Quotas for Douglas county communities in the Fifth War Loan campaign were announced today by Dr. E. E. Boring, campaign chairman.

Douglas county has been given a quota of \$1,124,000, of which \$499,000 is assigned to corporations, with \$529,000 to be raised through sale of E bonds to individuals and \$96,000 in F. G. and other types of securities.

Apportionments of the \$529,000 quota have been made by the committee as follows:

Roseburg	\$219,000
Reedsport	90,000
Drain	85,000
Canyonville	15,000
Myrtle Creek	35,000
Glendale-Azalea	35,000
Oakland	15,000
Sutherlin	35,000

Letters have gone out to community chairmen, Dr. Boring reports, outlining the method of conducting the sales campaign and urging efforts to complete quotas as quickly as possible. Cooperation of every resident in the county is urged in buying bonds early in the campaign, in an effort to reach the county's assigned goal early, instead of late, in the drive, if possible.

The state headquarters has notified county chairmen that three Victory ships are to be sponsored in the name of as many counties having highest per capita sales of E bonds. Five counties in the metropolitan area, namely, Columbia, Washington, Multnomah, Clackamas and Hood River, will be in one district. All of the counties west of the Cascades, except those previously named and excluding those previously named and excluding Jackson and Josephine, will compose the second district, and the third district will include Jackson and Josephine counties and those east of the Cascades. One ship will be assigned to each district, and the county having the largest per capita sales in its district will be eligible to act as ship's sponsor.

Naturally, Dr. Boring reports, Douglas county, which always has stood high in per capita sales, should be able to win for the second district and every effort will be put forth to achieve the honors.

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Yanks Scale Blak Cliffs To Oust Japs

Stalemate Turned Into
Mop-Up in Campaign to
Get 3 Vital Airfields

ADVANCED ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, New Guinea, June 3.—(AP)—Mop-up squads of cliff-scaling Yanks ferreted Japanese snipers from limestone caves and hunted down machinegun nests on wooded ridgetops as the week-old invasion of Blak Island, stalemate since Monday, moved back into high gear today.

A big push by reinforced sixth army units toward three airfields—potential bases for bombing the Philippines—was pointed along a coastal road, hitherto a death trap because of murderous fire poured down from the ridges.

Blak, main island in the Schoutens 880 miles southeast of the Philippines, was invaded in Dutch New Guinea's Geelvink bay last Saturday. The Japanese pulled out of Bosnek village on the southeast coast, allowed the Yanks to move along a shore road to within half a mile of Mokmer, then cut loose with withering blasts which forced the invaders back a mile and a half.

While reinforcements were landed, Yank units fought their way to ridgetops and a spokesman said today "we now are mopping up." In coordination, Liberators and Mitchells skimmed the ridges to spill 80 tons of explosives on Japanese there and at Mokmer.

Headquarters reported that small groups of Japanese planes were attacking the Bosnek beachhead at night, losing one in the latest effort to anti-aircraft gunners, but the enemy airforce refrained from showing up in daylight.

Fliers Raise Fund for
Son of Heroic Mother

LONDON, June 3.—(AP)—A fund of almost \$3,000, contributed by U. S. airmen at a Ninth air force base, will provide for the education of four-year-old Tony Everitt— orphaned when his mother died trying to save American fliers from a burning plane.

Mrs. Betty Everitt dashed into the inferno when the plane crashed last Saturday near her farm home. She saved one man, then continued her rescue efforts until the bomber exploded.

Jail Terms Given Two

Stop-Dewey Faction Wins Indiana Round

Pledge Rejection Helps
Campaign to Forestall
1st Ballot Nomination

(By the Associated Press)
A last-ditch stop-Dewey movement apparently had taken on new life in the republican party today as a result of the action of Indiana's GOP convention in shouting down yesterday a proposal to pledge the state's 29 votes to Gov. Thomas E. Dewey for the presidential nomination.

Opponents acclaimed the Indiana setback as the beginning of a shift they believe may prevent a first ballot nomination. With 64 votes previously pledged and claimed for their candidate, backers of Gov. John W. Bricker, of Ohio, hailed the Indiana results as a sweeping victory.

Dewey supporters came out of the convention with a minimum of two delegates to boost this pledged and claimed total to 390. In addition, they claimed the support of six others.

But the contention of the Bricker faction, and that of other Dewey opponents, is that there are enough opposition votes among the 478 delegates thus far chosen who are unpledged and unclaimed, to tie up the nomination beyond the first ballot and make the result uncertain.

The convention nominated Homer E. Capehart, Indianapolis manufacturer, for the long-term seat in the U. S. senate. Capehart, who first gained national prominence with his GOP "cornfield conference" at his Washington (Ind.) farm in 1938, and who generally is regarded as a Dewey supporter, defeated James M. Tucker, of Paoli, former secretary of state and a medically-discharged naval officer, who withdrew.

"GI" War Bond Created
For Service Personnel
