Portland Crusade Aims At Excess Living Costs

PORTLAND, June 3 (AP)—A crusade to drive living costs down in this area was under way today. Backers said 50,000 persons would be enrolled.

Shipyard workers, who made up a committee on price investigation, said the crusaders would "use every legal means to put profiteers out of business." This will include refusing to buy commodities for more than ceiling prices and spurning non-ceiling commodities that are priced too high.

Jerry Parks, a shipyard supervisor, declared at a mass meeting that his \$62.50 weekly pay check dwindles to less than a dollar after all deductions and costs of living are taken out.

Criticism Hits Use of Gas in Federal Travel

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—People on government business still are traveling 300 million to 400 million miles a year, the Byrd economy committee declared yesterday, and burning 20 million to 30 million gallons of gas.

Progress toward cutting down such travel, it added, is "neither substantial nor impressive."

The committee, a joint senate-

house group with treasury and budget bureau representation and headed by Senator Byrd (D-Va.), continued:

"It is apparent that the federal government is in the position of urging the state governments and its citizens to drastically cut down on the use of automobiles, the consumption of gasoline and tires, while its own record is not as good as it might be."

Armstrong Loses Rubber Battle To Willie Joyce

CHICAGO, June 3 (AP)—Henry Armstrong, boxing's former triple title-holder, stepped on a broken rung on his return climb up the fistic ladder to the game's pot of gold last night.

Willie Joyce, the 26-year-old Negro who broke even in two previous encounters with the former king of three boxing divisions, upset the fistic dope book and won the rubber match by a unanimous decision in a ten-round fight at the stadium.

Belying his 32 years and 13 years of ring warfare, the Los Angeles Negro, an 8 to 5 favorite, never stopped swinging from the opening bell to the end. And while he displayed his championship form in power and motion, many of his punches missed their target.

Thus Joyce, who weighed 139 compared to Armstrong's 141, broke hammerin' Henry's consecutive ring victory string of 10 bouts and dealt him the second of four beatings suffered by the former champ since he returned to the ring two years ago.

NEW YORK, June 3 (AP)—An all-New Jersey 10-rounder in Madison square garden last night wound up with Tippy Larkin of Garfield the winner by an eighth-round technical knockout, and Freddie Archer of Newark in a hospital.

The scrap was even until Larkin landed a flurry of rights to Archer's jaw to win his third verdict over his fellow statesman. Archer, unconscious for several minutes after the bout, was ordered to a hospital where X-rays showed a slight concussion.

Mrs. E. McGovney Dies in California

Mrs. Esther McGovney, daughter of Britt S. Nichols, Roseburg, died Tuesday, May 30, at Birmingham hospital, Van Nuys, California, where her husband, Major R. B. McGovney, is serving in the army medical corps. Her death occurred after a short illness.

A native of Roseburg, Mrs. McGovney graduated from the Roseburg schools and was employed in the Douglas county health department prior to her marriage in 1929, when she went to Santa Barbara, California to make her home.

Surviving are her husband and three daughters, Ann, Susan and Meredith; her father, and two sisters, Lieutenant Marion Nichols, Camp Stoneman, Richmond, Calif., and Mrs. T. J. Slattery, employed in the Douglas county tax department.

Funeral services were held at Santa Barbara, Calif., Thursday.
