PORTLAND, June 5—(AP)—The state executive committee of the American Legion is opposed to the return of all Japanese, including American-born, to this area until after the war.

The committee urged Governor Snell to call a special session of the legislature to amend statutes to permit Oregon men and women in the armed forces to vote in the coming election. It favored admitting into legion membership men still in the service providing they join posts in their own communities. Only discharged veterans now are eligible.
