Cruising timber is a good hiking job, particularly in the area mentioned here—to gain a mile forward a fellow has to travel another one, up and down. These are those "mountain miles" one reads of, I reckon. Jack, compass

man, has such long legs he merely steps over, or straddles, lots of the ridges. Mr. Murdock, cruiser, is not so tall; but then he has to take plenty of time anyway, as he estimates the board feet contained in some four species of merchantable timber standing on the location. It's always been a marvel to me how accurate a cruiser's estimates usually are. They have to be, for that matter; the cruisers employed by opposing parties to a deal never would afford satisfaction otherwise.

The day before this picture was snapped Jack and Mr. Murdock

discovered a "corner" blazed and marked by Malcolm Doble, an uncle of Mr. Murdock's, in 1918. Rather a coincidence, as Mr. Murdock hadn't known his uncle had worked in that locality.

Loggers who have purchased this timber and other stands up Coffee creek are preparing to construct a road to their holdings, which will branch from the highway at a point near Mary Furlong's house and take up the west bank of the creek. Most of the right-of-way has been arranged for. The timber to be logged is chiefly Douglas fir.

Mrs. E. Erickson, Douglas Resident 80 Years, Passes

Mrs. Emma Bonebrake Erickson, 86, widow of the late F. E. Erickson, died suddenly Monday evening at her home, 1020 West First street, Roseburg.

She had attended church Sunday and although she was not feeling well Monday, went about her home as usual until late evening, when she was sicker, suddenly while sitting in her chair and died within a few minutes.

Born in Iowa, Aug. 27, 1857, she was six years of age when she crossed the plains with her parents, John Starr and Mary E. Bonebrake, who settled on South Deer Creek. Mrs. Erickson was a continuous resident of Douglas county after the family's arrival.

She was a member of the Rebekah lodge and American Legion auxiliary.

Surviving are two sons, V. V. Harpham, Roseburg, supervisor of the Umpqua National forest, and Everett E. Harpham, Eugene. She also leaves three brothers, George, Fred and Will Bonebrake, all residing in or near Roseburg, and two sisters, Mrs. William Van Buren, Roseburg, and Mrs. Wm. Geminder, Redding, Calif.

Funeral services will be conducted by the Rev. Morris H. Roach at the Roseburg Undertaking company parlors at 2 p. m. Wednesday, with interment following in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.
