He was a member of the Masonic lodge.

Surviving are his foster daughter, Miss Ila Laubach, who cared for him during his illness; a nephew, Ellerthorpe Mansfield, Redmond, Ore., and distant relatives.

Masonic services will be conducted at the Roseburg Undertaking company chapel at 3 p. m. Thursday and the body will be taken to Portland for vault entombment at River View abbey.

Seals Lead League; Hal Turpin Loses 15-Inning Battle

The San Francisco Seals climbed into first place in the Pacific Coast league by defeating the tail-end Sacramento Solons, 5 to 2, last night while Portland and Los Angeles were idle because of transportation difficulties and Hollywood and San Diego called off their contest because of D-day.

Manager Camilli led his Oakland Aorns to a 5 to 2 victory over the Seattle Rainiers by starting two rallies, the first of which tied the score in the ninth and the second of which gave the Aorns their three-run margin in the thirteenth inning.

Hal Turpin went the full route for the Rainiers, allowing 15 hits. Seats won his tenth game of the year as the Seals defeated Sacramento. The Seals scored three runs in the second, sending Pitcher le Gault to the showers after four straight hits.

Hollywood Leads League Parade in Batting

LOS ANGELES, June 7.—(AP)—After seven weeks, Hollywood has displaced San Francisco in first place on the Pacific Coast league baseball batting record, with the Seals second and the Oakland Aorns slipping from second to third spot.

The Stars' percentage, including last Sunday's games, is 264, with San Francisco averaging 262 and Oakland 261. Hollywood was in third position last week.

Third baseman Charles English of Los Angeles was the official individual batting leader with a .362 percentage. Marv Owen, Portland third baseman, was officially second with .335, and Dolph Camilli, Oakland first baseman, third, with .330. However, Owen was the star of the lot, with 58 hits and 38 runs in 50 games, against English's 14 runs in 28 games.

Planes Strafe Balkans. The Mediterranean allied air force joined yesterday in the many-front assault on Hitler's Europe by sending between 500 and 750 Flying Fortresses and Liberators into the Balkans. Targets included the oil refineries at Ploesti, rail yards at Brasov and Pitesti and the "iron gate" canal at Turnu-Severin in Romania, and rail targets at Belgrade, Yugoslavia. Thirty-four enemy planes were destroyed against a loss of 16 bombers and 17 other aircraft.

These air attacks from the Mediterranean came as other American bombers from the new shuttle bases in Russia were

Kahut, Earling Matched For West Coast Title

PORTLAND, June 7.—(AP)—A 15-round bout billed for the Pacific coast lightweight boxing championship will be held next month between Vern Earling, 175, Hayden Lake, Idaho, and Joe Kahut of Woodburn, Ore., Matchmaker Joe Waterman announced.

Earling holds the 175-pound title for Idaho, Washington and Montana and boasts nine straight knockouts. Kahut, Oregon titlist, was undefeated until he was recently by Lloyd Marshall, duration light heavyweight champion.
