## Roseburg Soldier Wins Silver Star



WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, Italy—Private Eldred B. Clark, above, Roseburg, Oregon, has been awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action on the allied Fifth army's Anzio beachhead below Rome.

Machine gunner in the 3rd "Marne" division, Clark and another soldier left the cover of a small crest where the rest of the men of his section had gone to escape fire from six German machine-guns. Clark put his gun in an exposed position on top of the hill and opened fire on the enemy guns, in turn drawing fire.

Although his comrade was wounded and the Germans loosed intense mortar fire upon him, Clark kept firing.

He remained with his gun for an hour until American tanks relieved him and destroyed the enemy emplacements.

## School Children's Program to Aid War Effort Calls for \$500 Million From Total of 30 Million Youths

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 7.—Fifty cents a week isn't much, but this kind of War Stamp and Bond selling by America's thirty million school children is adding up to 500 million dollars worth of trouble for the Axis—in war equipment.

And the Fifth War Loan will see these junior, but skilled salesmen in final action for the school year, climaxing the Treasury's Schools at War bond selling program.

This year's school performance focused on army-navy equipment campaigns, shows that the Treasury's estimate of 500 million dollars in Stamps and War Bonds sold by school children this year is a moderate one.

It is based on the solid fact that American boys and girls in this war are doing a lot more than making noises like a machine gun; they're helping to pay for them.

**Past Results Cited**  
In September of last year the kids of this country set out to buy jeeps for the army. They raised money in War Bonds to the tune of quotas set at the cost of one jeep, \$1,165.00, and turned in reports of 33 thousand accounted for, plus 11,600 amphibious jeeps at \$2,090.00 each, and 11,400 flying jeeps at \$3,000 each.

For good measure they threw in 1,690 parachutes, 6,170 life floats, 5,190 motor scooters, all of which totaled \$100,872,000 invested in this war in the shape of War Bonds.

As they pored over army equipment lists, gauging their bond selling powers to meet war costs, the group choices ranged from planes to potato peeling machines.

Aside from the plane campaigns which could only be undertaken by the biggest schools, the greatest favorite was the field ambulance—1,490 of them at \$1,750 each.

The ten ranking favorites in equipment after this were 572 complete clothing outfits for soldiers, 512 propeller deicers, 406 submarine guns, 381 50 mm mortars, 330 mules, 330 diving
