### New Italian Cabinet Will Exclude Fascists

ROME, June 9—(AP)—Ivanoe Bonomi assumed today the task of forming a new Italian cabinet which, it was said, will be wholly anti-fascist in character and exclude arsy men who ever collaborated with Benito Mussolini's fascist regime.

Marshal Badoglio, who stepped down as premier Tuesday, will not be included in the new government. The marshal was said to feel he had performed his duty in heading a government during the interim between Mussolini's fall and the allied liberation of Rome.

Bonomi, who is 71, was premier for a short period in the

spring of 1922 before the fascist era.

Crown Prince Umberto, acting in his new capacity as Lieutenant-General of the Realm, yesterday asked Bonomi to form a new government to succeed that of Badoglio.
