SALUTE THE FLAG

TODAY is Flag Day when we celebrate the action of Congress in formally adopting the Stars and Stripes as the national flag. That act occurred June 14, 1777, but it was not until many years later that our flag was standardized in its present form.

General George Washington, at Cambridge, Jan. 2, 1776, without authorization from the Continental Congress, raised a flag of alternate red and white stripes with the crosses of St. George and St. Andrew on a blue field.

A member of the committee appointed by the Continental Congress to design a flag, described the significance of its arrangement as follows:

The stars of the new flag represent the new constellation of States rising in the West. The idea was taken from the constellation of Lyra, which in the land of Orpheus signifies harmony.

When Kentucky and Virginia were admitted to the Union, Congress, in 1795, changed the design to include 15 stripes and 15 stars.

But with the admission of more states, further modification was necessary, and in 1818 Congress enacted a law providing:

That from and after the fourth day of July next, the flag of the United States be thirteen horizontal stripes, alternate red and white; that the union have twenty stars, white in a blue field.

Thus today we have a flag to which we pledge our allegiance; a flag which symbolizes progress, harmony, freedom, vigilance, perseverance, justice, perpetuity, equality, bravery and purity.

There is a sect which refuses to salute that flag, their action being based from an argument that to do so would be "idolatry."

But if we, by our reverence of that flag, give testimony of our belief in and acceptance of the Christian virtues it symbolizes, then it is a privilege to be able to render our salute.

New R. H. S. Coach Producer of Title Winning Talent

Mel Ingram, recently employed by the Roseburg school district as high school athletic coach, has arrived from Wallace, Idaho, to take over his new duties.

Coach Ingram is a graduate of Gonzaga university and was an athletic star during his course there, where he was graduated with an A. B. degree and a minor in physical education.

During 15 years in the high school there, working with a student body averaging about 250, he has won the championship of the Panhandle football conference 11 times and has never finished out of the first division.

In basketball his teams have gone to the state tournament seven times in 15 years, although he has never won the state title.

His track teams have won two state meets, have been champions of the Panhandle conference six times, and have won the North Idaho conference five times.

While at Gonzaga university, Ingram was employed during vacation seasons with the city recreation program at Spokane, and at Wallace directed the Hecla mining company recreation program outside of school months.

He states he is well pleased with the athletic facilities at Roseburg and is hopeful of being able to maintain a record for winning teams in the major sports.

Ouster of 2 Marion County Solons Sought

SALEM, Ore., June 12—(AP)—State Sen. Lew Wallace, democratic national committeeman, said today he would file suit here in an effort to have Sens. Frederick Lampert and John Carson, both of Salem, ousted from their jobs.

Lampert and Carson were selected by the Marion county court to succeed Sens. Douglas McKay and Allan Carson, who are in military service.

Drew Soldier Wins War Valor Badge

WITH THE AMERICAN DIVISION AT BOUGAINVILLE—For his performance of duty in action against the enemy on Bougainville, PFC Donald N. Bratten, Drew, Oregon, overseas seven months, has been awarded the combat infantry badge.

The badge, worn above the left breast pocket, is a silver rifle on a field of infantry blue within a silver border, an elliptical wreath in the background.

PFC Bratten is a rifleman in a veteran infantry regiment which fought at Guadalcanal with other units of the American division securing the island on February 9, 1943.

Major General Robert B. McClure, of Palo Alto, Calif., commanding the American division, saw action on Guadalcanal and led the amphibious attack that took Vella Lavella in the Solomons.

The division, formed in New Caledonia, is the only division in the United States army having a name instead of a number.
