DeGaulle Given Warm Welcome On French Visit

LONDON, June 15—(AP)—The French committee of national liberation reported today that Gen. Charles De Gaulle during his trip to the Normandy beach-head had "left everywhere instructions regarding resumption of civil administration, organization of supplies and public relief."

In a communique issued through the French press service, the committee said De Gaulle had been given a "most moving demonstration of courage and devotion by the population of Isigny and that elsewhere he was greeted in the same atmosphere of immense fervor."

Gen. De Gaulle, back in Britain after a triumphal reception on French soil, today laid before British and American political and military councils a claim of enthusiastic support from newly-liberated Frenchmen to back his demand for recognition of the French committee of national liberation as the voice of France.

De Gaulle was said to be planning tentatively to return briefly to Algiers to report to the French consulate assembly on the result of his discussions with the British and with Gen. Eisenhower, before proceeding to America to see President Roosevelt.

The London press hailed the general's swift trip to the Normandy front with the expressed hope it would help solve the ticklish situation.

Action Laid to Anger

De Gaulle's return to France yesterday, for the first time in four years, received a warm welcome from cheering crowds.

While he was receiving his ovation in Normandy, qualified sources in London said De Gaulle had withdrawn all but a handful of fighting French liaison officers at the very moment allied troops were moving on the assault beaches. A similar report came from high authorities in Washington.

It was said here that these officers had been counted upon by the allied supreme command to act in a liaison capacity with the French people to help take over civil administration.

His action was attributed to anger over the allies' non-recognition of his national liberation committee as the provisional government of France and the refusal of the supreme command to let him take over the issuing of radio directions to the French people on D-day.

More Molasses Allocated Farms

Ample supplies of molasses for Oregon dealers to sell to farmers for making grass silage or for use in cherry fruit fly control have now been assured, says N. C. Donaldson, administrative assistant in the state AAA office at Corvallis.

The War Production board and the western division of the AAA have notified the Oregon office of the release of an additional 60,000 gallons of molasses for immediate use, and have also arranged for dealers to file appeals for additional allotments if needed.

Some difficulty has been experienced under the allocation procedure because a 1941 base was used, which was before the big increase in grass silage making in Oregon. Donaldson explained. Under the new plan the 1941 base will not serve as a restriction where more is needed.

Manufacturers and handlers report that plenty of molasses is available this year for essential uses and that enough is stored, either in Oregon or close by, so that farmers can depend on getting whatever supplies are needed.

Minnick Speaks To Lions Club on Progress of 4-H

Kenneth C. Minnick, county 4-H club agent, was guest speaker at the Roseburg Lions club dinner meeting in the Umpqua hotel last night. He announced there were now 1593 4-H club members in Douglas county and that 177 of these were carrying individual projects which include: gardening, rural electrification, marketing, arts and crafts, canning, cooking, homemaking, clothing, crops, forestry, livestock, poultry, woodworking and flowers. There is a total of 124 organized 4-H clubs in the county, of which Health clubs lead with 33 clubs enrolling 730 members. All health clubs, Mr. Minnick stated, have completed their projects 100 per cent.

Mr. Minnick introduced Betty Lou Weseman, outstanding Douglas county 4-H club member, to the Lions, and President Jack Fariss presented her with a 4-H club certificate in recognition of her excellent work in club activities, covering a period of 10 years. Miss Weseman thanked the Lions for the interest they had taken in 4-H activities and expressed appreciation for the

award she received.

The Lions club is this year sponsoring a contest which will award \$500 in prizes of war bonds and stamps to 4-H club members. Club members taking garden, canning, beef, dairy, sheep, swine and poultry projects will be eligible for prizes.

Lion Harold Hickerson reported on recreational activities of the Lions and stated that the Lions were the only service club in Roseburg sponsoring recreational activities. He said the softball league had been organized by the Lions club and early results indicated a very successful league year.

Dry Wrinkled Peas to Go Into Feed Mixture

Use of dry wrinkled peas from government stocks as an additional protein supplement for mixed feeds in Oregon has been authorized with an allocation of 625 tons for June, says R. B. Taylor, chairman of the state USDA war board. These are peas that had been purchased by the government from growers of canning peas under an arrangement made to insure the planting of ample acreage for a maxi-

mum pack of green peas.

The dry peas will be distributed immediately among Oregon feed mixers by the state feed advisory committee. They will be ground and blended, thus providing not only additional protein feed but also some feed elements normally supplied by barley or other grains.

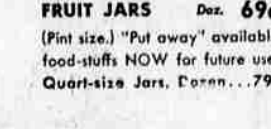
