

Young's Bay Wins From Dunham Nine; Alleys Also Tops

Softball fans witnessed two exciting games at Finlay field last night as Young's Bay Lumber company defeated Dunham's Transfer 13 to 7 in extra innings, while the Roseburg Lumber company, making its first appearance in league play, lost a substantial lead and was beaten 8 to 6 by the Roseburg Bowling Alleys.

The first game of the evening, played between the Young's Bay and Dunham teams, was a grueling contest. With the score tied 1 to 1 at the end of seven innings, the Young's Bay team to all intents and purposes sewed up the game in the first of the eighth with two runs, but Dunham's came back full of fight and tied the score at 3-all in the last half of the frame. The battle continued into the 10th inning, when Dunham's blew sky high and the defense plant team pushed over 10 runs. The Transfer outfit, however, was not through and staged a beautiful rally, which, however, was cut short by four runs. Mandan, Wilmer and Fred Schierner each hit for three bases during the course of the contest, Wild Frames Fatal.

Blake, twirler for the Roseburg Lumber company, displaying a fast windmill delivery, had the second game his own way except for two wild innings, which were enough to spell defeat.

He held the Alleys scoreless for the first two innings, in which the Lumbermen scored two runs, adding four in the third. In the last of the third, Blake lost control and the Alleys punched over five runs. Tucker went to the mound for the Alleys in the fourth and held the Lumbermen scoreless for the balance of the game. The Alleymen were unable to score in either the fourth or fifth, but Blake ran into trouble again in the sixth to permit three runs and an 8 to 6 victory for the Alleys.

Ervin F. Goetz, Roseburg, has arrived at San Diego marine corps base for "boot" training. Son of Fred Goetz, 527 N. Jack-

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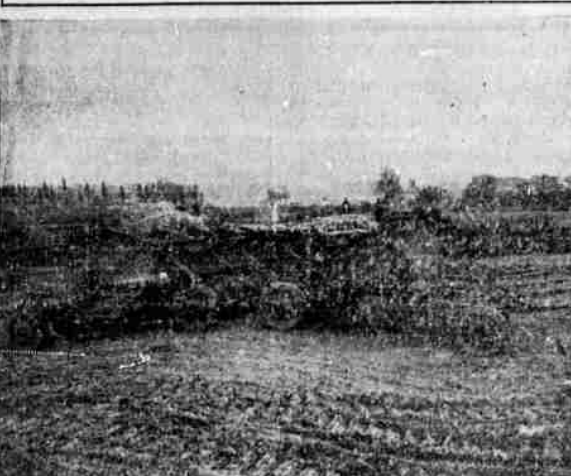
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son St., he was employed with Roseburg Lumber company prior to entering military service. His wife and son will reside in Cottage Grove.

Seals Climb To Tie With Beavers For League Lead

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- 3 1/4 Cups Juice
- 4 1/2 Cups Sugar
- 1/4 Cup Lemon Juice
- 1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Pick berries from stem. Wash and crush thoroughly. If they do not liberate much juice add a little water and mash again.

Squeeze out juice. Measure exactly 3 1/4 cups of the squeezed juice (add water to fill last cup, if necessary) into a large kettle. Add the M.C.P. Pectin, stir well, bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), continue stirring and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 2 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, skim. Pour into sterilized glasses, allowing 1/2-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.

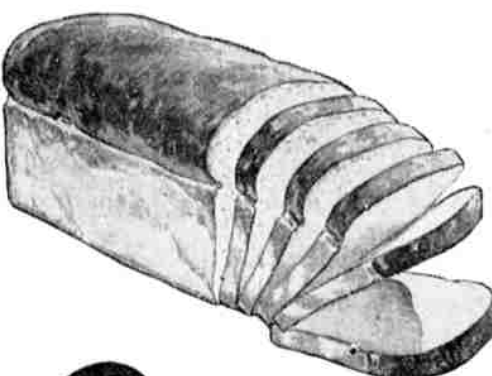
