This is his first furlough since entering the service and upon its completion he will report at Camp White, Medford.

Truck Owners Urged to Apply for Gas Rations

Truck owners requiring gasoline rations for the quarter starting July 1 should make applications immediately. It was announced today by Story Iles, executive secretary of the Roseburg war price and rationing board.

Early applications, Iles said, will make it possible for the board to process the requests prior to the expiration of the existing ration and thus prevent delays in getting the new allowance.

Any truck owners who delay filing applications, until after Aug. 1, he reports, will be forced to secure new certificates of war necessity, as existing certificates will be cancelled unless renewed by the first of August.
