HIGH PRAISE GIVEN TO WORK OF WAVES

High praise of the work of the Waves given by Admiral Ernest J. King, commander-in-chief of the U. S. fleet and chief of naval operations in a recent report to the secretary of the navy has been reiterated by officers-in-charge of the naval stations and activities in Oregon where Waves are now on duty, according to a report just released by Chief W. E. Bell of the Roseburg U. S. navy recruiting station, which handles Wave applications in this area.

Increasing efficiency in handling the navy's mass of business in many phases of its operations in Oregon is reported by these officers-in-charge, bearing out Admiral King's report on the success of the Wave program in his review of the progress and expansion of the navy since the beginning of the war.

Waves are on duty at these naval activities in Oregon: U. S. Naval Air Station, Tillamook; U. S. Naval Station, Astoria; U. S. Naval Air Station, Astoria; U. S. Navy hospital, Klamath Falls; U. S. Naval Air Station, Klamath Falls; Supervisor of Shipbuilding office, Portland; Office of Naval Officer Procurement, Waves Enlistment section, Portland; Air Warning Service, Portland; and Office of Industrial Relations, Portland.

"As a result of their competence, their hard work and their enthusiasm, the release of men for sea duty has been accomplished in many cases, particularly in offices, by increase in efficiency," wrote Admiral King in his report. "The material consequence is in a 'esprit de corps' which embraces their value to the navy, and it is a pleasure to report that in addition to their having earned an excellent reputation as part of the navy, they have become an inspiration to all men in naval uniforms."

The high standards which must be met by the Waves before being accepted and "their overpowering desire to make good" will earn for them an excellent reputation as a part of the navy.

Approximately 65,000 Waves are now on active duty; present plans call for 100,000 Waves on active duty by the end of 1944.

Admiral King further reported that there are nineteen training schools at which Waves are trained in their chosen specialty

and that approximately one-fourth of all enlisted women are now on duty with naval aviation activities.

Waves now handle more than 250 navy jobs, formerly exclusively the work of men. This wide range of jobs offer opportunity for many women with nearly any civilian training, experience of aptitude. 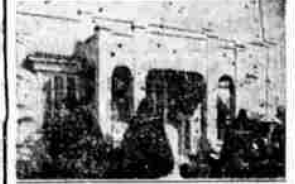

Wounded Will Further Cut Civilian Train Travel

PORTLAND, June 16.—(AP)—Civilian railroad travel will be still further curtailed by transportation of war wounded, Felix S. McGinnis, vice-president of passenger traffic for the Southern Pacific, warned yesterday. The San Francisco man said that American railroads are prepared to transport up to 30,000 wounded men a month—increasing demand on the nation's 7900 Pullman cars, 5000 of which are already devoted to military movement.

TRUE PATRIOTS HONORING A HERO

WHISKY TRUST RUSHING TO CAPITALIZE ON MAJOR BONG'S HEROISM

A new ace, Major Bong, has a record of enemy airplanes shot down in aerial combat, exceeds that of our national war hero, Eddie Rickenbacker.

A clear head, a steady hand, perfect vision, marvelous coordination, clear judgement, quick, clear and cool mental processes, a faith in the right and years of clean living, spiritual associations, and a clean living parentage back of him, all contributed to his success.

But the whiskey makers rushed in to claim his as their own. From their files they dug up the story that Eddie Rickenbacker had promised a case of whiskey to the first pilot beating his own world war record—a case of whiskey from an ace who had steadily and often warned against the danger of drink, and who positively refused the hundreds of pilots (employed by his air line) the privilege of drinking on duty, or for twenty-four hours before they went on duty.

The newspapers of America gave America the truth. They found out that Major Bong preferred soft drinks rather than whiskey, and instead was an abstainer. General MacArthur—and this has no political tinge—announced that whiskey was not an appropriate tribute to an aviator. The records show that an aviator is safer in combat in MacArthur's command, that insists on "no drinking before or on duty." The fact that the rules against the use of alcoholic beverages is stringently enforced, may be the reason, the American Business Men's Research Foundation points out, because scientific military tests show even moderate use of alcohol impairs co-ordination and marksmanship.

Eddie Rickenbacker now makes a statement that the pilot who abstains is a better pilot. And the newspapers of America carried all this for it was news. Bang up Bong news. Those who resent the liquor traffic's attempt to debauch the youth of America by such publicity should realize that newspapers want news and will print it.
