

25,000 Boys, Girls Needed For Farm Work in Oregon

Twenty-five thousand boys and girls—about 5,000 more than worked in the fields last summer—will be needed this year to help harvest Oregon's crops, according to Russel M. Adams, assistant state farm labor supervisor in charge of youth workers.

Hundreds of these boys and girls already are out in the fields. Through the cooperation of schools additional thousands have been recruited and are awaiting calls from county farm labor offices when Oregon's many seasonal crops come into full production, Adams says.

Approximately a fourth of those boys and girls, it is estimated, will work in organized youth platoons, which proved highly successful in 18 Oregon counties last year. These platoons are groups of from 25 to 40 youngsters supervised by an adult leader and trained especially by the farm labor office in each county in cooperation with growers and processors. The platoons in the most instances are able to take the place of a field boss in directing the harvest.

and instruction in how to work, Adams points out. On the other hand, many farmers need only small groups which are more elastic in filling needs as they arise. More than twice as many youngsters worked independently as in platoons last year, and Adams reports that the platoons are organized only as needed.

Approximately 20 platoons have been organized and are at work in the Portland area, with additional groups to be formed later. They have also been organized in most Willamette valley counties. Youths may register for harvest work with any county farm labor employment office.

Lucius Hall Of Sutherlin Passes

Lucius Hall, 99, of Sutherlin died in Roseburg June 15. "Dad" Hall, as he was known to his many friends, was born at Markleysburg, Pa., February 22, 1845, the son of Rev. and Mrs. Larklin Hall. At the age of 18 he moved with his parents to Tama county, Iowa. He was the second child in a family of 15 children. He was married February 23, 1879, to Isophene Haynes, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. James Haynes, of Garwin, Iowa. To this union, four children survive: Mrs. Vena Cox, Glendale, Ariz.; Emmett Hall, Montour, Iowa; and Emil Hall, Sutherlin. The eldest daughter, Mrs. Irene Leonard, who resided in Calapooia valley west of Sutherlin, died July 10, 1938. He also leaves two aged sisters, Mrs. Julietta Hartsell and Mrs. Julia Tuttle, Sandy, Ore.; five grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

The Hall family moved from Garwin, Iowa, to Hoquiam, Wash., in 1902, where they resided until 1907, when they moved to Douglas county and resided on a ranch west of Sutherlin until 1911, when they moved to Wilbur. In 1919, they purchased a home and moved to Sutherlin, where Mrs. Hall died in 1925. Mr. Hall had been a member of the Church of the Brethren since 1875. Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Two Super-Bombers Lost in Japan Raid Through Accidents

Although allied sources have made no mention of such a raid so close to Japan, the enemy report came while American landing forces were battling the Japanese garrisons after going ashore in the Marianas, another 700 miles or so to the southeast.

The Japanese broadcasts declared that damage in the Bonin Islands raids was "extremely slight" and claimed that 17 of the raiding planes were shot down.

Say Korea Also Raided

Some hours after the first enemy acknowledgement of the American attack other broadcasts told of enemy planes raiding points in Korea (Chosen), on the Asiatic mainland immediately opposite the Kyushu section of Japan.

These reports failed to give a definite time for the Korean raid, but it may have been part of an attack on greater Japan. In one broadcast, Tokyo asserted the raiders approached Kyushu by flying over Antung, on the Manchuria-Korea border—a report which, if true, would have carried them over Korea.

Tokyo asserted that Japanese anti-aircraft batteries had been "forewarned" of the approaching planes and that the attack came as no surprise.

road company as a financial aid in the construction of the tracks through Oregon. The investors were members of the Minneapolis firm engaged in the manufacture of flour.

Following the reversion of the grant lands with the federal government, a trade agreement was reached, whereby trades were made to permit the Pillsbury interests and the government to form solid blocks. The government, however, suffered through accident, from the exchange, as a large part of its holdings were lost in the Tioga forest fire a few years ago, while the Pillsbury timber was only slightly damaged.

The holdings roughly include the major portion of timber lying between the Roseburg-Coo's Bay highway on the south and the Umpqua highway on the north and on both sides of the coast range summit.

The Weyerhaeuser company is one of the largest timber concerns in the nation. It has a large-scale pine operation in the Klamath Falls area, and operates extensively in Washington. Its laboratory at Longview, Wash., is one of the largest in the United States. The company in recent years is reported to have spent several millions of dollars in development of new processes to eliminate wood waste. It is planning its holdings on sustained yield cutting programs and is engaged in extensive tree farming.

army is rolling down both highways towards Vilpuri—one running straight through the forest and lake country and the other a roundabout road that skirts the Finnish gulf.

Col. Gen Gonorov's breakthrough, which took the Red army 25 miles in five days on a 50-mile front, has given the Russians a grip on two-thirds of the Karelian Isthmus.

Trickery Charged

The Finns will be battling shortly to hold the Russians back from Vilpuri itself. The Red army is not under-estimating the battle which it faces. The struggle for the second Mannerheim line is far harder than the fight for the first line, in which the surprise element aided the Soviets.

Simonov reported "It is an interesting note that according to the testimony of captives" who told the Russians about the new Mannerheim line that construction began on the day when Finnish representatives in Sweden raised the question of peace negotiations with us. On the very day that (Dr. Juhok) Paasikivi took off for Moscow, (Marshall) Mannerheim went to Kivnappa to inspect the line."

This information caused new and immediate indignation in Moscow.

right rebellion. The allied command said:

"The Germans are dancing to our tune."
RAF rocket fighters, fighter-bombers and fighters pounded nine northern France railroad centers from Charters in the Paris area to Granville on the west coast below the battle line in operations late yesterday and last night.

Then, moving in even closer to the Normandy fighter area, these planes shot up troops and tanks hidden in an orchard, observation posts and a radio station mainly around the Caen area, an artillery concentration near St. Lo in the American sector, a panzer headquarters near the front and numerous Sene bridges, shipping and ferries.

In dog fights over the Caen battle ground last night one squadron of RCAF Spitfires shot down nine Messerschmitts from a formation of 20 for a loss of two Spitfires, one of whose pilot was safe.

Italy-based Lightnings and Mustangs of the U. S. 15th air force shot up five enemy airfields in the vicinity of Avignon in southern France yesterday, while bombers hammered communications in northern Italy. Seven enemy planes were shot down while 18 allied aircraft were lost.

As the aerial assault in support of the Normandy invasion rolled on this morning, the German radio reported hostile aircraft approaching the Austrian provinces of Carinthia and Styria.

7,000 Young Turkeys Die In Brooder House Fire

NEWBERG, Ore., June 16—(AP)—Seven thousand young turkeys perished in a fire which destroyed the brooder house on the Frank Marshall poultry farm near here yesterday. The blaze apparently began in a broken fuel oil line.

Bombs Leave Ruin in Vital Jap War Plant

important of several heavy industrial cities. It is separated from Honshu, the island on which Tokyo is situated, by the narrow Shimonoseki-Moji strait under which a railroad tunnel has been built in recent years.

(A lucky bomb hit choking up this tunnel would put a serious crimp in the movement of materials and products to and from this industrial center.)

(Within 15 miles of Yawata important centers are Sasebo, one of Japan's two largest naval bases; Nagasaki, huge port and other important steel, shipbuilding and marshalling and troop embarkation centers.)

The blow fell at a psychological moment when American amphibious forces were striking deeper into the island of Saipan in the Marianas, 1,500 miles from Tokyo, where the U. S. air bases would permit the heaping of bombs on Japan's industrial structure.

Bangkok Raid Recalled
The Super-Fortresses which can carry more explosives faster,

higher and farther than any other plane, flew from a network of bases laboriously carved from western China plains by 450,000 conscript and contract Chinese laborers—men, women and children.

Except for the Doolittle token raid this was the first time Japan has felt the brunt of real air power.

Actually, however, this was the second Super-Fortress raid. These planes bombed the Makasan railway shops at Bangkok on June 5 in a combat shakedown operation.

A southeast Asia communique on June 8 called this the "heaviest blow of the war" on Bangkok.

"Black smoke rose to great heights through the clouds as the bombers, despite bad weather, pressed home widespread attacks on railway shops and marshalling yards," the communique said that day.

"The city's defenses apparently

were caught by surprise as the formations converging on the target at a great height from all angles dropped a record tonnage of demolition and incendiary bombs on this important Japanese port.

"Anti-aircraft fire was heavy but generally ineffective and only a few planes rose to intercept. These, however, failed to attack the mass formations."
