The GI bill of rights is now in the hands of President Roosevelt. This is the bill for which the Legion has worked so many years and will provide education, loan privilege, job placement and aid for the jobless in the way of compensation. The president has also signed bill H. R. 3377 which provides monthly increased rates of compensation for men with service incurred disability. The bill also increases the pay for widows and orphans of veterans who had a service connected disability at time of death. H. R. 3377 provides for increased compensation for permanent and total non-service connected disability of veterans of both wars, except where the veteran has held permanent and total disability rating for ten continuous years or has reached 65, the payment is to be \$60 instead of \$50 a month. This has been \$40 a month. Any veteran can get in touch with Roy Young to learn more details. Both the Legion and auxiliary urge veterans and families to attend Legion and auxiliary meetings to consider membership in a group which can help in every way.
