## Sgt. Darrell Lincks, Missing in Action, Still Unheard From

The war department has notified Mrs. Maxine O. Lincks, Myrtle Point, that her husband, Staff Sergeant Darrell R. Lincks, son of Mrs. Floyd Smith, 1150 Corey Ave., Roseburg, who has been missing in action over Germany since March 11, 1944, is still unheard from.

When last seen, the B-17 bomber on which Sergeant Lincks was serving as flight engineer, was crippled from anti-aircraft fire and was going down, apparently under control, over the English channel, after having completed a bombing mission over Munster, Germany.

Sergeant Lincks was completing his 13th mission over German and enemy-occupied Europe. He was with the 8th AAF in England, having arrived overseas early in December 1943. On a previous mission, he and his crew had escaped injury when their first Flying Fortress was destroyed during combat.

He and Mrs. Lincks made their home in Roseburg prior to his enlistment in December 1941.

## Paul E. Aubin, Roseburg Plumber, Passes Away

Paul E. Aubin, 60, a life-long resident of Roseburg and vicinity, employed for many years in the plumbing trade, died Sunday at Emanuel hospital, Portland, following a long illness.

He was born at Olalla, July 28, 1883.

## Col. Olson Named Acting Adjutant General of Oregon

SALEM, Ore., June 19—(AP)—Col. Ray F. Olson, member of the Oregon National Guard since 1916 and who was finance officer of the 41st division in the Southwest Pacific, was appointed Oregon's acting adjutant general Saturday by Governor Snell.

Col. Elmer V. Wootton, state selective service director, asked Governor Snell to relieve him of his duties as acting adjutant general.

Brig. Gen. Thomas E. Rilea, who went to the Southwest Pacific as assistant division commander of the 41st Division, and who now is commander of a large army base port in Australia, is adjutant general, and Colonel Olson will serve until General Rilea's return to Oregon.

Colonel Olson served in the First World war as a first lieutenant in the Oregon engineers, and he re-enlisted in the Oregon National guard on his return to Oregon. He was promoted to captain in 1923, and in 1927 became a major.

In 1931 he was assigned to the 41st Division as its adjutant and was promoted to lieutenant colonel. He also served as intelligence officer and as property disbursing officer for the Oregon National guard.

When the guard was inducted into federal service in 1940, he became finance officer for the 41st Division.

After serving a year with the division in Australia and New Guinea, he was returned for hospitalization last year to the United States. He was released from the hospital in April, 1943, and was sent to Fort Bragg, N. C., to serve as fiscal officer. He recently was given a medical discharge from the army.

He will take over his new duties July 1.
