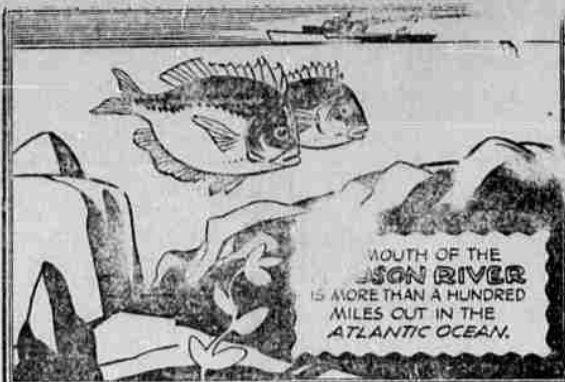

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Pitiable Plight of Civilians in War-Ravaged Italy Described by Sgt. M. McCord of Glide, on Furlough

The plight of civilians in Italian battleground areas is extremely pitiable, says Sergeant Melvin McCord, a resident of Glide, who has returned home on furlough direct from the Cassino campaign.

McCord, a squad leader in a mortar platoon of a tank battalion, fought through the North Africa and Sicily campaigns before joining in the Italian landings. He was engaged in the Cassino campaign for two months, and for five weeks was continuously in the combat area and exposed to enemy fire.

"A great many of the civilians," he reported, "evacuated their homes in advance of the battle, but a large number remained. We found whole families, with cows, pigs and chickens, living in caves. The filth was indescribable. How they managed to exist we could not understand, but they did live through it and came out as soon as their areas were cleared to restore their small farms."

"Others had large homes, built of reinforced concrete and stone. They moved from top floors and from rooms around the exterior of the buildings. Concentrated in the center of the three and four-story buildings, and on the ground floor, they were comparatively safe from bombs and shells. They had further security in their wine cellars or caverns, which are to be found under most of the homes in that area."

War Leaves Desolation
"Italy is a beautiful country, except where the war has been. The ground is terraced and care-

fully tended. Every piece of ground which can be cultivated is made to grow something. But where our battles were fought the whole countryside is a scene of desolation."

The rain, mud and snow made the winter campaign a nightmare, Sergeant McCord reported. The men who participated in the campaign underwent terrible hardships.

Entering the service in March, 1941, McCord went overseas in April 1943. He was withdrawn from the Italian area in March and spent 29 days en route back to the United States. But he had not fully escaped the mud and rain even then as on the trip across the continent he was forced to make a wide detour around midwest flood areas.

He arrived at his home in Glide Saturday and will remain until July 9, when he is scheduled to report at Camp White, Medford, for reassignment.

Prior to enlisting for military service, he was employed with the forest service on the Umpqua National forest.
