The North Umpqua highway. That portion of it lying east of Rock creek and traversing the Diamond lake area is in the best condition I ever remember seeing it. With the exception of the Copeland creek grade, its surface is smooth and hard-packed. While it is rough, the grade above Copeland is easily negotiable. The highway now is gravelled as far as Big Camas.

Forest crews are established at Steamboat, Dry creek, Big Camas, The Y at the highway's intersection with the Skyline trail and at Diamond lake, and some of the fire lookouts are manned. Trails and roads are being cleared of fallen trees and rocks and the telephone lines are undergoing repairs. Forest service activities are well under way for the season. In this area they largely are concerned with the prevention and control of fire.

In the higher elevations, beyond Copeland creek, the dogwoods are in bloom, while hill-sides flash with the blossoms of rhododendrons, now at the height of their glory. Openings in the forest are carpeted with a profusion of little wild flowers whose names I don't know and couldn't remember if I heard them. Half-way down the trail to Lemolo falls I found a patch of bleeding heart.
