Gehrig's Trophy Brings \$1 Million At War Bond Sale

DALLAS, Tex., June 21.—(AP)—Lou Gehrig's baseball feats lived again today in the form of \$1,000,000 in war bonds to back the country that paid tribute to him when he was the greatest player in the American league. The trophy Gehrig won as the prize of the New York Yankees in 1934 was auctioned off at a war bond wrestling show here last night and drew a cool million. The show itself contributed \$5,150,000 and a case of Scotch whiskey brought \$181,000. The Gehrig trophy was contributed by PFC Frank Twitchell, brother-in-law of Columbia Lou, and will be sent to the McCloskey General hospital for war wounded at Temple, Texas.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—(AP)—The Fifth war loan has pushed past the 16 per cent mark in the drive for individual bond purchases. Sales to individuals through Monday, seventh day of the campaign, totaled \$864,000,000 toward their quota of \$8,600,000,000, the treasury announced. The total goal is \$16,000,000,000. Only individuals' purchases will be credited to the drive until the end of this week, second in the four-week campaign.

PORTLAND, June 21.—(AP)—In the next 100 days American fighting men will write history for 100 years to come and their efforts must be backed with bonds. So declared E. C. Sammons, Oregon war bond chairman, last night. "Ted Gamble says this war is costing us \$250,000,000 a day," Sammons said. "Oregon's share is \$125,000,000, or one 12-hour shift."

Gelatin O. K. For Rayon 'Starching'

Ordinary household gelatin may be used as "starch" to restore rayon dresses that have become limp and crush easily after washing, reports Miss Lucy Lane, extension specialist in clothing and textiles at Oregon State college. Information on this new way of handling rayon fabrics has been received from the U. S. department of agriculture. Starch is not used successfully with rayon fabrics but plain, granulated gelatin, softened and then dissolved in water, will give somewhat the same body or filling. For most rayon dresses two tablespoons are enough, although more or less may be used, according to the stiffness desired. Less can be used for sheer rayon. Gelatin is softened first by soaking a few minutes in a little cold water and then dissolved in boiling water. The solution is poured into a container large enough to hold the dress and enough cold water added to make it comfortable to the hands. The dress is washed and rinsed and then dipped in the gelatin solution, and then squeezed gently and rolled in a thick bath towel until dry enough to iron.

Ellsworth Joins Protest Against Monetary Plan

NEW YORK, June 23.—(AP)—Reps. Hal Holmes of Washington and Harris Ellsworth of Oregon were among 21 republican members of congress signing a joint letter to the New York Times expressing doubt that congress will approve "the plan for monetary stabilization which Secretary Morgenthau proposes to advance at the forthcoming conference at Bretton Woods."

The only purpose of such a fund now, they held, "would be for furnishing reconstruction

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fun through an international pool, the great bulk of these funds coming from the dollars deposited therein." "We prefer to retain control over those dollars." They proposed creation by congress of an American reconstruction fund under the supervision of an American board of directors, confirmed by the senate, the fund to act separately or in joint account with foreign governments, individuals or corporations.

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
