

N. Umpqua Road Improvement for Logging Planned

A. R. Lundeen of the Young's Bay Lumber company, Leonard Nystrom of the Eugene Plywood company, and A. K. Wilson of the Wilson Logging company were named today to represent Douglas county sawmill and logging operators using the North Umpqua road, as a committee to direct efforts to secure reconstruction of the road on standard sufficient to carry heavy logging traffic.

The appointment was made at a gathering held at the courthouse in Roseburg, where approximately 20 operators met with the county court to discuss ways and means of improving the road, which, it is claimed, will not be available for hauling during the forthcoming fall and winter months unless immediate action is taken to provide heavier surfacing.

Attending operators pledged financial cooperation and the committee is to meet with the War Production board and Public Roads administration to determine whether federal funds can be made available to aid in reconstruction between Roseburg and Rock creek.

F. R. Will Accept Fourth Term Bid, Gov. Arnall Says

WASHINGTON, June 20.—(AP)—Governor Arnall of Georgia came out of President Roosevelt's office today and predicted the chief executive will accept a fourth term nomination if it is tendered him by the democratic national convention.

The governor, freely admitting he had "talked politics" with the president, said he would not be surprised if Mr. Roosevelt makes a public statement shortly after next week's republican convention "as to his willingness to abide by party decisions irrespective of his personal desires and that he will submit to the mandates of the democratic convention."

The Georgia democrat voiced this comment to reporters as he left the White House after an appointment with Mr. Roosevelt which some democrats in congress hailed as a peace gesture toward southern democrats, some of whom have been cool toward the fourth term movement.

The governor said Georgia's electoral vote will be pledged to support the party nominee and said the action could be taken as a castigation of Texas, Mississippi and South Carolina, where proposals have been made that electoral votes be withheld if the democratic platform contains planks distasteful to the south.

French Patriots Score

Bloody hand-to-hand fighting for Cherbourg was matched over two thirds of France where the French underground is striking at the Germans on a dozen "inner fronts," tying up "several German divisions" in combat, a special communique from Gen. Eisenhower's headquarters reported.

The French patriots, the supreme command announced, have blocked movement of German troops against the bridgehead, have fought several pitched battles, and have even occupied several towns in various parts of France.

Top-Notch Circus Pleases Big Crowd

T top-notch show and a clean one summarizes the quality of the performance in West Roseburg last night of the Russell Bros.-Clyde Beatty circus. Fair weather brought a crowd that almost taxed the capacity of the big top, which seats about 5,000. Only criticism heard was from sundry spectators who were assessed 20 cents for a sack of peanuts—which contained about that many goobers—or a like sum for a package of crackerjack (valuable prize in each one). Chief result was that the elephants did not get a very liberal supply of gratuitous handouts.

Outstanding feature of the show was Beatty's act with a cage of lions and tigers, which lived up to all advance notices of being a hair-raising thriller and fully bore out Beatty's national reputation as a wild animal trainer. Practically all the remainder of the show was along the usual lines of modern circuses but it was his class, particularly the act of a trio of acrobats that marked the finale.

Lumber Wage Boost In Northwest Refused

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negotiating committee would meet in Portland next week to take action on the wage denial. He said the committee represents 55,000 workers from Belingham, Wash., to Fresno, Calif.

Doyle Pearson, assistant secretary of the AFL northwestern council of Lumber and Sawmill workers, said an executive committee meeting would be called immediately.

The previous walkout ended only when the WLB agreed to reconsider its earlier decision.

Labor members of the WLB, dissenting from the majority opinion, said the decision failed to take into account the effect of a general wage increase toward retaining present employees in the industry. This viewpoint was echoed by Gallagher in Seattle who predicted:

"We are going to lose lots of men from the industry. They won't go on working when they can get more elsewhere."

Differentials Approved

Last night's decision also upheld previous directives of the West Coast Lumber commission, with minor exceptions. The directives extended the payment of night shift differential of 25 cents a shift to the pine industry, established a safety program for some operations and also provided for differentials of 25 cents a shift for the second shift and 40 cents a shift for the third shift in the plywood operations of the Douglas fir regions.

The decision covered 77 cases including more than 2,000 lumber operations in the states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana.

The board also added a clause to the vacation provisions of the previous directive denying vacation pay to a worker who voluntarily quits or is discharged before the end of the vacation base year unless he is rehired or has worked enough hours to qualify.

War Bond Sales Reach 4th of National Quota

WASHINGTON, June 23.—(AP)—Bond sales to individuals in the Fifth war loan moved along today toward 25 per cent of the goal.

Through Wednesday, ninth day of the drive, individuals purchased \$1,217,000,000 of their \$6,000,000,000 quota out of the total goal of \$16,000,000,000.

Starting next week, all non-banking purchases will be credited toward the drive, which ends July 8.

PORTLAND, June 23.—(AP)—Fifth war loan purchases in Oregon totaled \$23,749,902 today, nearly one-fifth of the \$125,000,000 goal. Series E bond sales totaled \$8,305,044.

Black sea to the Baltic. There was a possibility that the operations reported by the Germans merely were masking attacks for a main Russian blow which would fall elsewhere later. It seemed likely the Russians were satisfied that the Finnish clean-up was in hand and were moving into the main battle in coordination with the allies.

Red Drive Unchecked

A broadcast Russian communique and other Moscow dispatches gave this picture of the continued success of the triple offensive in Finland:

From the northern tip of Lake Onegskoe, red army units rolled 10 to 15 miles westward in the direction of Lake Ostero and cleared a section of the Leningrad-Murmansk railway by capturing three important stations.

To the south along the Svir river the red army expanded its bridgehead to a depth of at least six miles on the river's north bank, and captured Podporozhye, a district center of the Leningrad region.

North of Viipuri on the Karelian Isthmus Marshal Govorov's conquering army captured Tali, five miles north of the fallen sea port, as well as several other places in the flourishing farming and manufacturing belt that extends toward Helsinki, the Finnish capital.

Govorov's right flank was hitting toward the rail and highway center of Lappeenranta, 30 miles northwest of Viipuri. Capture of Lappeenranta would sever the Finns' main communications with their forces, estimated at 100,000 men, in the area of Lakes Ladoga and Onegskoe, far to the north-east.

This penetration could also close a trap on the main Finnish forces remaining in the Viipuri area and east of the Salma canal, Moscow dispatches asserted.

to any veteran for service connected disability be increased by 20 per cent of the basic amount on each fifth birthday after the age of 40 years, providing that the total amount should not exceed the amount payable for total disability. Another amendment would change the regulation which cuts service disability pensions to \$20 per month and non-service connected compensation to \$8 per month whenever a veteran enters hospitals or domiciliary units to provide that no such reduction be made during the first three months of hospitalization.

The convention also urged that presumptive cases, those which lack proof of being service connected, but may reasonably be believed to have such status, be restored to full compensation; that a minimum rating of permanent partial disability of 10 per cent be awarded any veteran wounded or gassed in active service; that eligibility for pension be extended the widow of any deceased veteran providing she was married to and living with the veteran for two years preceding his death or if, being married to the veteran, she gave birth to a child by the veteran.

American Subs Sink 16 More Japanese Ships

and plans of Salpan Island in the Marianas in pursuit of 20,000 Japanese troops surrendered to their fate by their fleeing navy. The Americans had complete air and sea control and the ground fighters had the advantage in numbers and firepower. They have all but conquered the whole Marlene bayshore. Tokyo radio admitted American reinforcements were pouring in.

The navy last night disclosed the identity of the tremendous U. S. fleet which in two days last weekend sunk or damaged 14 enemy ships and shot down at least 368 planes. It is task force "58," consisting of perhaps 20 first-class carriers and a host of battleships, cruisers and lesser craft. Its stamping grounds is "the entire Pacific ocean to the gates of Japan," the navy said. Task force "58" can hurl explosives from 850 big rifles ranging in size up to the largest coastal defense guns. Vice Adm. Marc A. Mitscher is its commander.

Japanese Imperial headquarters said of the Salpan naval battle that it had been "unable to inflict a decisive blow upon the enemy," and went so far as to admit the loss of a carrier, two tankers and 50 planes. It called its action a "Forestalling attack."

Dark News From China

The Japanese army, exerting tremendous pressure to build its defenses before the triumphant American navy pushes through to the Asiatic mainland, today drove down the Hankow-Canton railway to within 33 miles of Hengyang in south-central China.

The darkness of the news from Chungking, in striking contrast to the telling victory of U. S. na-

val task force off Salpan, prompted Chinese authorities to say a battle for China itself may develop from the Hengyang fighting. Thousands of civilians were fleeing the threatened city.

All enemy troops, have been cleared from the Kohima-Imphal road for the first time since March 20, southeast Asia headquarters said, signifying Japanese failure to break the Indian supply line to Burma and China.

General MacArthur's airmen bombed Noemfoor Island off Black near Dutch New Guinea, and attacked a 15-ship enemy convoy near Palau, sinking one enemy merchantman.
