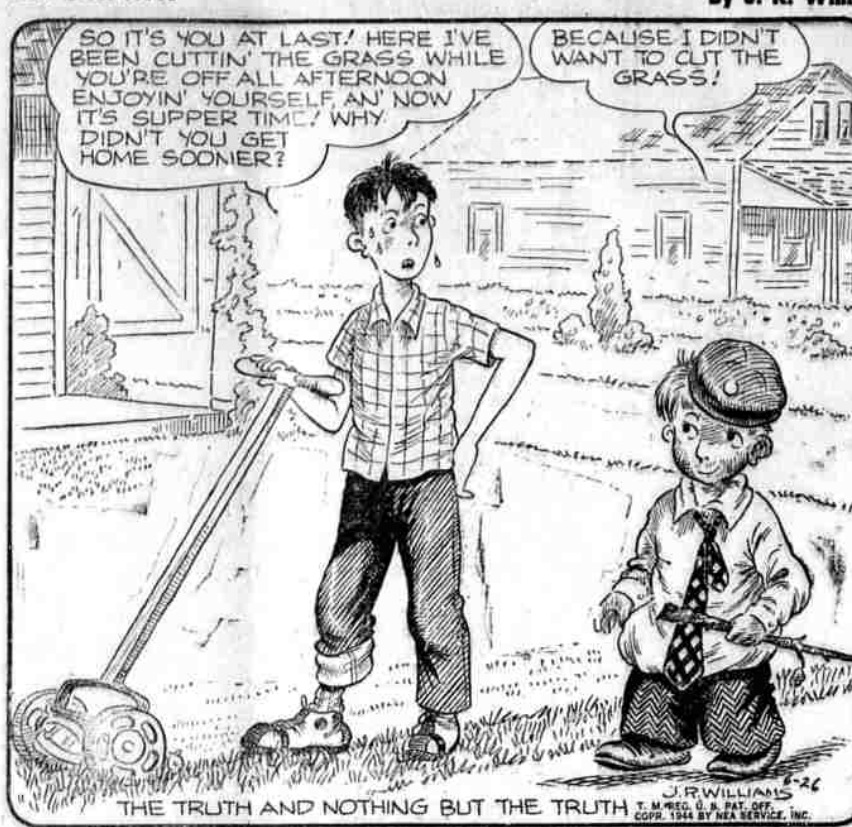

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Roosevelt Names U. S. Delegates to Monetary Session

WASHINGTON, June 23—(AP)

President Roosevelt today named 12 government leaders and prominent economists to represent the United States at an international monetary conference to be held at Bretton Woods, N. H.

The American delegation will be headed by Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau and will include a bipartisan representation from the banking and currency committees of the senate and house.

Mr. Roosevelt said still to be named are technical experts who will advise the delegates.

Serving with Morgenthau will be:

Fred M. Vinson, economic stabilization director, vice chairman; Assistant Secretary of State Dean Acheson; Edward E. Brown, president of the First National bank of Chicago; Foreign Economic Administrator Leo T. Crowley; Marriner S. Eccles, chairman of the Federal Reserve board of governors; Mabel Newcomer, professor of economics at Vassar college; Rep. Brent Spence (D-Ky.), chairman of the house committee on banking and cur-

rency; Senator Charles W. Tobey (R-N.H.), member of the senate committee on banking and currency; Senator Robert F. Wagner (D-N.Y.), chairman of the senate committee on banking and currency; Harry D. White, assistant to the secretary of the treasury; Rep. Jesse P. Wolcott (R-Mich.), member of the house committee on banking and currency.

TELL 'EM IN 39 LANGUAGES
