## Railways, Oil Plants Bashed By Air Fleets

U. S., British, Russian Planes Raid Targets in Balkans, Poland, Italy

LONDON, June 27—(AP)—Up to 500 American bombers attacked Budapest and Yugoslav railroads at Brod today and U. S. strategic air forces in Russia announced the bombardment of a synthetic oil plant Monday at Deoboyez in Poland. From yet a third direction, British Halifax bombers from England attacked a military installation in northern France. Clouds and near gales over the channel, however, limited air blows from Britain although Mosquitoes by night bombed Gottingen in northwest Germany and Nazi troops encamped south of Caen in Normandy.

The American heavies from Italy fought through screens of Nazi fighters and destroyed an unspecified number in reaching the overcast Hungarian capital and Brod. Targets at Budapest were not named and the clouds obscured results. The Brod yards were well covered.

The planes flying from the Russian shuttle bases were convoyed by U. S. Mustangs and Russian Yaks. "Excellent weather prevailed and crews reported good bombing results on the target," approximately 75 miles west of the west-bound Russian front. U. S. strategic air force headquarters in Russia announced. The attack group apparently returned to Russian bases.

The British daylight attack was without loss. The only other activity reported overnight for Britain-based allied air units was a foray by a half dozen RAF Beaufighters which administered a heavy pounding to a formation of E-boats near the hook of Holland without loss.

**Oil Plants Bombed**  
 From Italy last night allied bombers attacked the Aquilla oil refinery at the Italian naval base of Trieste as a follow up to yesterday's daylight attacks by American Flying Fortresses and Liberators on oil installations and an aircraft plant in the Vienna area.
