## Traffic Accidents In Oregon Inflict Big Economic Loss

Oregon's economic loss in 1943 as a result of traffic accidents is estimated at \$10,350,000, according to the booklet "Oregon Traffic Accident Facts," just published by the safety division of the office of Bob Farrell, secretary of state.

The booklet is the annual statistical review of the traffic accident experience of Oregon, covering facts and figures on 1943 accidents.

The economic toll of traffic accidents is based on a loss of \$45,000 per fatality, including insurance costs, medical service costs, lost earning power and lost production power.

The review of 1943 accidents, which may be obtained by writing the Safety Division, Secretary of State, Salem, Oregon, shows that the 1943 death toll of 230 persons was 15 per cent lower than the 1942 toll of 273 deaths. All types of fatal accidents except pedestrian and bicycle collisions with vehicles showed decreases under the previous year.

There were 86 pedestrian fatalities, compared to 68 in 1942, an increase of 27 per cent. Bicycle deaths numbered ten, an increase of 66 per cent over the toll of six in 1942.

The months of August, September and December had the greatest number of deaths of any months during the year, with 25 fatalities each month. February and April had the fewest, with ten each.

Eighteen per cent of all traffic accidents reported in Oregon in 1943 occurred in rural areas. But this percentage accounted for 65 per cent of all fatal accidents reported during the year. Private passenger cars were involved in 62 per cent of the fatal accidents.

## Cowboy to Drop Ballyhoo in His 3rd Senate Race

POCATELLO, Idaho, June 27 — (AP) — Cowboy Glen Taylor's lasso is whirling again. His quarry is the senatorial post that twice has eluded him, and Idahoans are set for another spectacular campaign.

Taylor won his third straight democratic nomination in the June 13 primary, ousting Senator D. Worth Clark by 216 votes, and immediately served notice he plans a rip-snorting campaign.

"Now that I have shown I can get votes with the queerest sort of campaign, I reserve the right in the future to sing, use a sound system, wear my cowboy hat or ride a horse," he said.

He did all these in 1940 and 1942—accompanied by his wife, Dora, and son, Arod—and defeated some of Idaho's strongest democrats. But his unorthodox campaigns drew criticism as well as back yard applause and colorful republican John Thomas, a banker and stockman, won both times.

After the last defeat, Taylor renounced his occupation as radio minstrel and took a war job in a San Francisco shipyard.

He returned to conduct a quiet primary campaign "to prove that my critics were wrong when they said I had to exploit my family or resort to ballyhoo and trick publicity stunts to get votes."

Now he promises to take off the wraps. "Maybe I'll think up a few other things to relieve the monotony for the poor voters," he declared.

His opponent is twice Gov. C. A. Bottolfsen, a formidable if quieter campaigner.
