## Preservation of American Freedom Demands New Deal's Ouster, Hoover Asserts in Scathing Denunciation

CHICAGO, June 28.—(AP)—Herbert Hoover was back in the political lists at 69 today after delivering the most scathing denunciation of the democratic administration yet heard at the republican national convention.

In a "fight until I die" speech, the only living former president told a cheering crowd of partisans last night that only by an upsetting of the Roosevelt administration "will our returning soldiers find freedom preserved at home."

The new deal, Hoover said, "forged shackles for the liberties of our people."

He declared the new deal smacks in milder form of tactics followed by European revolutions, and that President Roosevelt, the man who beat him in 1932, appears to be indulging in "power politics" and "personal power diplomacy" in foreign affairs. "not a diplomacy of freedom."

Before he mounted the platform, Hoover told newspapermen:

"I'm going to stay in this fight till I die. The fight is for everything that is precious to the American people."

Beating with apparent good health, Hoover ended speculation that he might not take an active part in this campaign. He left no doubt that he will be in the thick of the fight for a republican victory this November.

## Ex-Legion Chief Leading Sen. Nye In Primary Count

FARGO, N. D., June 28.—(AP)—Lynn U. Stambaugh, national commander of the American Legion in 1941-42 and a strong advocate of U. S. participation in world affairs, had better than a 2,000-vote lead over incumbent Gerald P. Nye for U. S. senator state's 2,251 precincts reported.

Stambaugh, a Fargo attorney, had 18,443, Nye 16,078, Representative Usher L. Burdick 12,116, and A. C. Townley 460.

Stambaugh is running as an independent, while Nye has the endorsement of the Republican organization committee and Burdick that of the non-partisan league which is battling the ROC for control of the republican party in North Dakota. Townley, one of the founders of the league but now estranged, also campaigned as an independent.

Both ROC candidates for republican nomination for representative are leading their league opponents, with incumbent William Lemke far out in front and Milton Young, Lamoure farmer, heading the too league candidate by nearly 2,500.

Three independent candidates for republican nomination as representative are trailing well behind.

Fred G. Aandahl, Barnes county farmer endorsed by the ROC for governor, was leading present Attorney General Alvin C. Strutz, the league candidate, 27,370 to 17,489 in 653 reported precincts.

In the only contest in the democratic column of the state's consolidated primary ballot, Attorney Halvor L. Halvorsen of Minot and Railroad Conductor J. R. Kennedy, of Fargo, both endorsed by the state democratic convention, were leading independent E. A. Johansson, Raub farmer.

## Bereft Mother Kidnaps Child of Another

SAN DIEGO, Calif., June 28.—(AP)—Mrs. Helen Kroger, formerly of Vancouver, Wash., was booked in the city jail on a kidnapping charge last night after having admitted abducting a two-year-old girl to replace her baby who died at birth, Detective Inspector Harlan Gibbs reported.

The officer said he was told by Mrs. Kroger that her husband, recently returned from 27 months with the marines in the South Pacific, was unaware of the death of their baby.

Mrs. Rosela Lucero, mother of the baby, told police her baby was taken from a clothing store by a woman who had offered to watch the girl while she was examining some goods. The baby was returned to Mrs. Lucero.

Funeral services will be held at the Roseburg Undertaking company chapel at 4 p. m. Thursday with interment following in the Civil Bend cemetery.

Pargeter, chairman of the Republican Central committee, that he be privileged to wear the first Dewey Bricker button received for distribution to supporters of the G. O. P. candidates.

## Maximum Crowd At First of Bond Shows is Urged

Persons holding tickets for tonight's war bond shows were urged by the bond committee today to fill the theater for the first show, starting at 7 o'clock. In the event too many people wait for the second show, which will start at about 9:15 p. m., some may be unable to find seats, Dr. E. E. Boring, campaign chairman, warned.

There has been a great rush of bond buyers during the past two days and bond headquarters reported continuing sales today.

Seats are still available, it was reported, but unless the two audiences are evenly divided, accommodations may be lacking at the second show.

The performance features a stage play in three scenes enacted by 10 all-army actors, presenting the production "The Call of Freedom," a gripping drama relating the experiences and emotions of a soldier returning from the combat zone to a strange homeland. The stage play will be presented in addition to the feature film, "Two Girls and a Sailor," a late musical comedy hit.

Persons attending the first show are warned to be on time because it will be necessary to clear the theater after the first performance and those who arrive late will not be able to see the entire performance.

The Camp White entertainers, who are furnishing the show as a contribution to the bond campaign, arrived in Roseburg this afternoon. The visiting group includes the 30-piece military band, which will play street concerts at the Victory center preceding each performance at the theater.

## F. D. R. Signs Bill Giving Vets U. S. Jobs Preference

WASHINGTON, June 28.—(AP)—President Roosevelt signed today a bill giving preference in government employment to honorably discharged service men, their widows and the wives of disabled veterans of any United States war.

The measure gives statutory effect to existing civil service regulations giving service-connected disabled veterans a 10-point preference and non-disabled veterans a 5-point preference in competition for federal jobs.

It eliminates from future preference ex-service men whose only service was performed in peacetime. However, peacetime veterans now in government employment or on civil service registers will not lose the preference they already hold.

The law also restricts to veterans, so long as applicants from that group are available, competition for jobs as guards, elevator operators, messengers and custodians and authorizes the president to add other positions to the list for five

years after the war's end. Requires the civil service commission to give credit to veterans for all "valuable experience" received while in military service, including experience in religious, civic, welfare, service and organizational activities. Provides for the waiver of age, height and weight requirements in cases involving veterans and permits waiver of other physical defects. Prohibits the establishment of minimum educational requirements for veterans except for technical or professional position. Requires an appointing officer to state in writing his reasons for passing over a veteran and selecting a non-veteran. Requires preference to be given to veterans in cases of reduction of the personnel of an agency or its abolition or merger. The legislation does not apply to positions requiring senate confirmation, except those of post-masters.

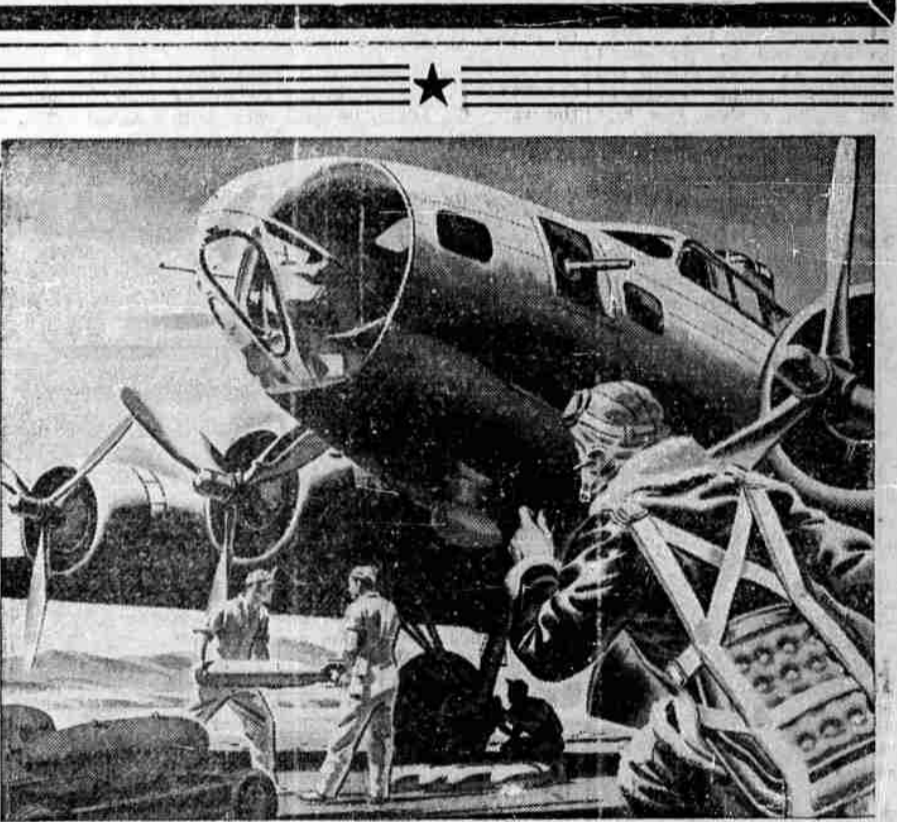
