British Comment On GOP Conclave Not Laudatory

LONDON, June 29—(AP)—War news kept stories of the republican convention in Chicago on the inside pages of British newspapers today and the average Briton showed only mild interest in the nomination of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey for the presidency. Although the papers gave full reports they were more or less routine and British correspondents generally expressed the opinion in their stories that the convention was apathetic.

Only the London News-Chronicle carried an editorial on the subject, saying, "the platform commits the party to participation in some form of world organization. Admittedly its terms are somewhat woolly—all the same, this is a very different state of affairs from that which existed in 1920."

The Daily Mail's New York correspondent wrote, "it may be stated frankly that the republican convention does not seem too confident of its chances of defeating the democrats. There is no victory mood in Chicago." Under a Chicago dateline, the Daily Express correspondent wrote, "the partly-filled stands remained as proof of the general apathy that has attended this, "the greatest republican convention ever."

Thousands of Japs Trapped by Aussies On New Guinea

ADVANCED ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, New Guinea, June 29—(AP)—A trap, already narrowed to 150 miles, was compressed today on thousands of Japanese at Wewak, British New Guinea.

The erasure of 80 jungle coast miles in 28 days by Australians who are within 70 miles of Wewak on the east was disclosed by General MacArthur. Americans have been approximately 80 miles from it on the west since Wewak was bypassed in the April 22 invasion of Altape. Altape is 90 miles away but Yank patrols since have pushed back east toward Wewak for at least 10 miles.

These thousands of imperiled Japanese have been left far behind by additional leapfrog operations which have carried MacArthur to Blak Island in the Schoutens off North Dutch New Guinea. Blak is more than 400 miles northwest on Wewak.

The Aussies approaching Wewak from the east have crossed the mouth of the Sepik river. In their 80-mile march from Buna-bun harbor, they overran the once strategic supply depot of Hansa bay, capturing ammunition, food, trucks and fuel. The Japanese retreated steadily toward Wewak and offered the Aussies only token opposition.

How many thousands of the enemy are trapped at Wewak is not definitely known. At the time Altape and Hollandia, in Dutch New Guinea, were invaded, the number of Japanese by-passed was estimated at 60,000.

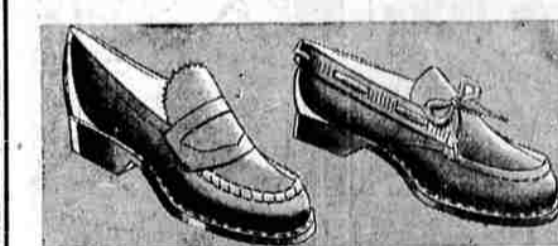

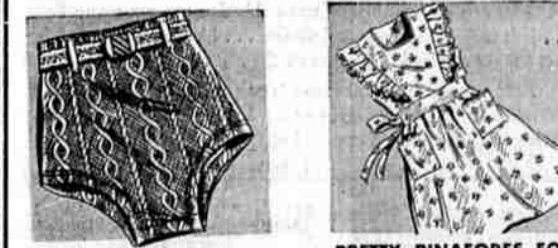

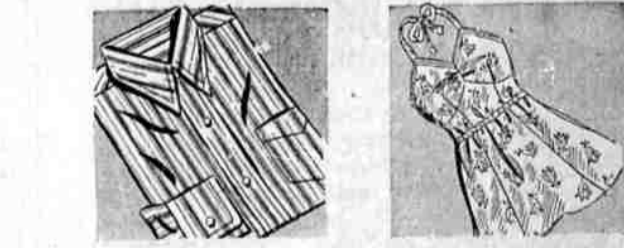
