Virgil Long and wife have bought acreage in Melrose near the home of his brother Bernard. They have rented a nearby house until they can build on their own place.

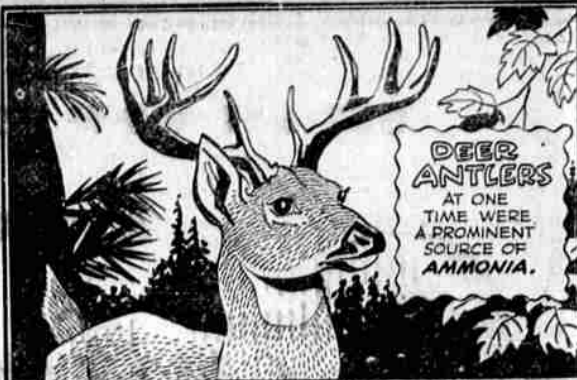
Miss Elsie Hagen has gone to Drain to visit friends.

AAA Program Changes Asked in Oregon Meetings

Oregon's recommendations for changes or variations in the 1945 agricultural conservation program have been submitted to the western division of the AAA by N. C. Donaldson, executive assistant in the state office. The recommendations embody suggestions made by the county AAA committees, state committee personnel, and the technical advisory committee of Oregon State college.

The first proposal is that no change be made in the practice of eliminating definite farm allowances, tried for the first time this year. The Oregon men believe that earlier so-called soil-building allowances seldom bore any relationship to the soil conservation needs of any particular farm.

The state and county committees were also unanimous in recommending the adoption of a conservative program on a continuing basis which would hold from year to year with only minor alterations.

The Oregon recommendations

also include a request, made and denied repeatedly, that construction of liquid manure tanks be recognized as a practice because "no other single practice would conserve so much fertility that is now being lost."

Plunge of Autos Takes 4 Occupants to Death

IDAHO CITY, Idaho, June 28—(AP)—An eight-man crew was ready to resume dragging operations today for an automobile which may have carried four persons to the bottom of Arrowrock reservoir late Saturday night when it plunged from the narrow canyon road.

Sheriff Bert Bybee said the crew apparently had located the machine yesterday in 50 feet of water.

He tentatively identified the victims as:

John Pfoser, about 70, Twin Springs, rancher and miner.

Mary Lou Burdick, 10, Pfoser's granddaughter.

John and Robert Card, young sons of Mr. and Mrs. John W. Card of Twin Springs.

The four went to Boise Saturday on a shopping trip, he said.

Answers Given to Questions on Labor Control Measures

With the extension of labor control measures, developed in the Portland-Vancouver area and other critical west coast labor centers since last November, to the rest of the state and nation, beginning July 6 in Oregon, by L. C. Stoll, state manpower director, a flurry of questions have besieged F. W. Chase, local office manager of the United States employment service.

For Example, "Do the extended regulations cover all manpower in Oregon?" is a question asked again and again by those employers and employees.

The answer, as given by Manager Chase, is "yes—except for men employed in agricultural pursuits or in the logging and lumbering industries."

Agriculture, says Manager Chase, has been specifically excluded from the labor stabilization system, and the logging and lumbering industries operate under a modified program providing a more fluid shifting of men from job to job within the industries without "priority referral" except for men who wish to leave logging or lumbering jobs for some other occupation.

"Just what is priority referral?" is another question Manager Chase undertook to answer in "half-penny" words.

Priority referral, according to Chase, is a voluntary method, agreed upon by labor, management and government not to hire any man unless he has been sent to fill that particular job by the United States employment service or another "referral" agency. A system of manpower priorities will be set-up as a means of channeling workers to critically urgent projects which are behind schedules.

In logging and lumbering occupations, a worker may move from one job to any other where there is an opening within the industry provided only he has a special "release" form from his last employer. He cannot be hired, however, by any person outside the industry unless he has been sent specifically to that job by one of the designated referral agencies, Chase stressed.

CHANGE IN SUGAR RATION

So that housewives can preserve as much fruit as possible, local rationing boards in areas where harvesting of crops occurs early now may issue the full 20-pound-a-person supplemental allotment of canning sugar at one time instead of over two periods. OPA regional administrators will designate the areas, which will be announced locally.

GET CONTAINERS EARLY

With a serious shortage of containers certain, due to a diminishing rate of production, growers who start a last-minute search for an adequate supply of secondhand containers are inviting marketing problems, WFA officials warn.

Potential problems in the container field are increased by the prospect of over-all fruit and vegetable production considerably in excess of 1943 when barely enough containers were available to handle these crops. WFA officials also caution that growers should be familiar with other types of containers that may be substituted for those normally used. It is highly probable that many growers will find that dealers do not have the type of containers that they prefer.
