

Labor Plank Not Satisfactory To Leaders of AFL

CHICAGO, June 28—(AP)—The republican labor plank, a slashing indictment of the new deal, basked in praise of a United Mine Worker's spokesman today but appeared unsatisfactory to the AFL and presumably to the CIO which is pro-Roosevelt.

K. C. Adams, editor of the United Mine Workers Journal and personal emissary of John L. Lewis before the labor subcommittee, called the plank "eminently satisfactory."

AFL President William Green, who presented his organization's proposals to the same subcommittee a few days ago, found the plank "disappointing" and said the G. O. P. "has missed a great opportunity."

All this brought into focus the political alliances and divisions within the labor movement. The proposals which Green laid before the subcommittee at the direction of the AFL executive council were largely disregarded. Yet the subcommittee's chairman, William L. Hutchison, is a dominant figure in the AFL council. But Hutchison, like UMW President Lewis, is a long-time republican. It was Hutchison who sponsored Lewis' application for readmission to the AFL. Lewis withdrew it when the federation refused to meet his terms.

The plank accused the new deal of "perversion" of the Wagner act to destroy collective bargaining, seeking to build up a totalitarian labor front and "political trickery." The labor department has disintegrated as a result, the plank said.

There was praise for all workers for a "magnificent productive effort but the language did not include the term 'organized labor.'" It pledged fair administration of laws designed for labor's welfare and a secretary of labor who is "representative of labor."

said that three terms were too many."

A middle course between international aloofness and full membership in any world state was advocated by the 1944 standard bearer on the touchy foreign policy issue.

"We are agreed, all of us," he said, "that America will participate with other sovereign nations in a cooperative effort to prevent future wars."

"There are only a very few," he added, "who really believe that America should try to remain aloof from the world. There are only a relatively few who believe it would be practical for America or her allies to renounce all sovereignty and join a super-state."

Senator Robert Taft of Ohio, chairman of the platform committee, told reporters: "He stands on the platform 100 per cent."

War Victory First Job

As his wife looked on intently, Dewey, first republican to win the New York governorship in 20 years, made these other points:

1. The first and foremost job is to win the war, and to defeat "once and for all" the German and Japanese will to make war.

2. The present military high command is "doing a superb job" and should be allowed to continue without any civilian interference.

3. The administration now is beset by internal squabbles and feuds—"wrangling, bungling and confusion." In seven pre-war years of "unequalled power and unparalleled spending, the new deal failed utterly to solve" the fundamental problem of providing jobs and opportunity. It has lived in "chattering fear of abundance," specializing in curtailment and restriction.

4. "This must be a land where every man and woman has a fair chance to work and get ahead... we republicans are agreed that full employment shall be a first objective of national policy."

Dewey departed from his prepared speech to the convention to say he is "happy and proud to be associated with my good friend from the state of Ohio, John W. Bricker."

Of the man he beat out for the nomination, then accepted as a running mate, Dewey said:

"Never before have I seen such good statesmanship and good sportsmanship as that displayed by John Bricker here this morning and I am proud to be associated with him."

Intensive Drive Planned

The candidate plans to remain here three or four days, mapping campaign strategy with republican leaders who long ago had predicted his first ballot nomination.

As the footweary convention crowds headed homeward, all signs pointed toward evolution of a highly organized and unified drive between now and November.

Typical of the resulting jubilant comments was that of Sen-

ator Clyde Reed of Kansas, who said:

"We've got not only a match for Roosevelt but a master on the platform to carry the fight to him on his own front."

The convention and Chicago's hottest weather in two years ended simultaneously last night.

Just as the sessions, concluded, a cool mass of air advanced to Lake Michigan, bringing relief to thousands after the three hottest days of the year.

On the opening day of the convention the mercury hit 95 degrees above; on Tuesday it touched 100— for a new season high and the warmest day in two years while yesterday temperatures were 98.

Today, with most republicans homeward bound, an 80 degree reading was forecast.

On Foreign Trade

Dewey told what he called the "world's biggest press conference" today that he hopes to confer with all of the nation's republican leaders, including Wendell L. Willkie, on presidential campaign plans.

Declining to discuss cabinet possibilities—If he wins the White House—the G. O. P. nominee gave speedily endorsement to many planks of the party's platform, including those of foreign policy, the president's fair employment practices committee, foreign trade and others.

Parts of the foreign trade plank may appear, at first blush to be inconsistent, he said, recalling that the plank promised an "adequate protective tariff" on competitive products designed to assure American standards.

"The essence of the plank is to be found in the latter part," Dewey said. "The party promises that this nation will work with other nations to promote greater trade. This is not inconsistent with the tariff part of the plank."

War Right Reserved

Questioned closely about his views on postwar foreign policy, Dewey said he did not believe the United States should surrender its "sovereign right to make war" to any international organization.

"The sovereign power to make war is primarily a defensive power on our part," he declared. "We have never fought any offensive war."

"How about the Mexican war?" a reporter asked.

"That depends on your interpretation," he said.

"The nominee defended state regulation of insurance companies at length, and promised a Negro reporter that he would live up to his oath to enforce the 13th and 14th amendments if he is elected.

American and Chilean Envoys Quit Argentina

BUENOS AIRES, June 29—(AP)—United States Ambassador Norman Armour and Chilean Ambassador Conrado Gallardo left here this morning for their respective home capitals.

(The state department announced earlier this week that Armour had been recalled to Washington for consultations).

Roseburg Soldier Finds Nazis Far From Supermen

The Germans are far from supermen, according to First Lieutenant Leland Russell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph L. Russell, Roseburg, writing from France, where he landed with the invasion forces on D-Day, June 6. The letter contains news that he has been promoted from second to first lieutenant.

"I have seen lots that I hope I never see again," Lieutenant Russell writes. Speaking of the combat action on the Normandy peninsula, he says: "It is rough, rugged, tough or anything else you want to call it, but we're beating their ears back and will continue to do so."

"The Germans," he states, "fight stubbornly, but in many instances we've had them walk out of the woods and surrender en masse. But I can hardly see myself in love with them once this is over, or forgetting the misery."

The country over which the battle is being waged is beautiful, Lieutenant Russell reports, appearing very much like Oregon. The people are friendly and are "glad to see the Yankees."

were destroyed and 200 enemy troops were wiped out in mopping up Casella, six miles northeast of Perugia. Among trophies taken were German railway guns with 70-foot barrels, firing 500 pound projectiles.

Nazi Despair Revealed

To illustrate the frame of mind of the bewildered Germans being beaten steadily back in Italy, an official spokesman cited this portion of a letter taken from a captured Nazi trooper on the Fifth army front:

"For us this is no war anymore. It's a cat and mouse game. Their superiority is so great in everything. Our soldiers have become indifferent as never before. * * * The Americans are finishing us off in their stride just as they please."

"T" Gasoline Coupons Will Be Replaced

WASHINGTON, June 29—(AP)—"T" gasoline coupons marked "2nd, qtr" (quarter) will be replaced by coupons bearing the designation "3rd qtr" July 1 through September 30, the OPA announced today.

These coupons, used by truckers, taxicabs and other commercial operators, become invalid at the end of each quarter, and "left-overs" are not usable, OPA explained.

Special rations which do not expire until after June 30 may be exchanged at local war price and rationing boards for the new coupons.

Hengyang Said In Flames

A dispatch from Chungking announced that the U. S. air force has abandoned its airfield at Hengyang, strategic city surrounded by Japanese forces, and a communique today said American P-51s dropped thousand pound bombs on the field—formerly one of the 14th's principal forward bases in China.

The P-51 attack, which took place Monday, was aimed at making the airfield useless to the enemy. It left one runway destroyed, Lt. Gen. Stilwell's headquarters said.

The communique added that Hengyang was reported to be in flames. Loss of this Hunan province center would be the greatest military blow in China since 1938.

Maj. Gen. Chennault's airforce was going all-out in an attempt to arrest Japan's drive down the Canton-Hankow railway, an of-

fensive designed to bisect China and make difficult the supply problems of both the Chinese army and the American air force. The communique reported attacks at a dozen different points along the railway and in the vicinity of Hengyang.

Stilwell's communique described Hengyang as a "Japanese stronghold" and said it was hit twice in a day by P-51s, with casualties and destruction of military installations.

(A Japanese broadcast reporting the fall of the American base described it as "one of the most important bases of the United States air force in China, from which the enemy had long planned to raid the Japanese mainland.")

(It said that other American bases at Kienow, Lishul and Suichuan were made virtually useless as the result of the capture of the Hengyang field and that American airmen are now operating chiefly from bases at Lingling, to the south, and Kulin.)

F. R. Seen Trying To Pacify Revolt Of Dixie Demos

Much interest has been aroused in Washington by a report from Governor Arnall of Georgia that President Roosevelt told him he was "very pleased" to hear that prospects are good for the re-election of Senator Walter F. George, whose defeat he called for in 1938.

George has continued to oppose some administration proposals and the president's reported remark led to the speculation about mollifying democrats down south who have complained, and acted, against the administration.

Bearing on the southern political situation were these other developments:

Governor Arnall, in addition to his report on George, predicted that President Roosevelt will be nominated for a fourth term and said he may make known his willingness to run by means of a public statement shortly after the republican convention. Arnall disparaged the talk of party revolt in the south.

Rep. Sikes (D-Fla.), however, called the threatened revolt of some southern democrats an important "movement for political and economic recognition."

The Texas supreme court, dealing Roosevelt supporters in the state a sharp setback, ruled that democratic presidential electors chosen by the state convention and not bound to vote for the party's nominees will be on the November ballot.

Bicyclist Killed in Collision With Auto

SALEM, Ore., June 29—(AP)—William H. Fredericks, 30, Jefferson, was killed early today when his bicycle was struck on the Pacific highway eight miles north of here by an automobile driven by Otto Mehlhoff, Salem.

Save Sugar and Berries with This Easy Recipe

6 Cups Ground Berries (Any Variety)
8½ Cups Sugar
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash, stem and grind 3 quarts fully ripe berries, or crush completely one layer at a time so that each berry is reduced to pulp. Measure exactly 6 level cups crushed berries. (add water to fill out last cup, if necessary). Into a large kettle. Add M.C.P. Pectin, stir well and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), mix well and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars, allowing ½-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin. (NOTE: For Strawberry Jam, add ¼ cup lemon juice to each 6 cups crushed berries.)

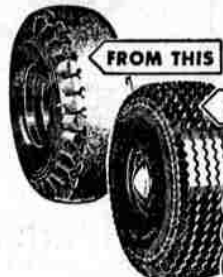
