SERVICEMEN'S WIVES ENLISTING IN WAVES

More wives of service men are now enlisting in the WAVES than at any time in the two-year history of this women's service of the navy in Oregon, which indicates the over-all popularity of women in the armed services among men in uniform, according to Chief W. E. Bell, of the Roseburg navy recruiting station which handles WAVES applications in this area.

Latest enlistment reports for Oregon show that 27 per cent of recent groups of young women departing for the WAVES indoctrination school at Hunter College, New York City, are married women whose husbands are in the armed services. A year ago, only 3 per cent of the enlistments were women with husbands in uniform.

Three main factors have caused the sharp increase in enlistment of married women. According to these reports:

"First, the service man has discovered that the WAVES offer the maximum of protection, care for health, training, education and fascinating work for his wife. As a WAVE she will have a good income, since the average WAVE, after four months' training, receives \$168.50 a month, including allowances. She has the best of food, medical care, living conditions—so GI Joe or the Navy Bluejacket can be sure that his wife is probably better cared for in the WAVES than in civilian life.

"Second, the wife of a service man who joins the WAVES can receive his \$50 allotment. This allotment, plus her income, plus his income gives the average couple a larger income than they could make in civilian life, considering the fact that it is tax

free and that all incidentals are paid for by the services.

"And third, the ruling eight months ago that wives of navy men, below the rank of ensign, can join the WAVES opened the service to many young wives. These couples discovered that it was a lot better and a lot more profitable for them for the Mrs. to be in navy uniform than to be living with relatives or trying to catch up with each other between tours of active duty on fighting ships or at advance bases. And, too, they got fed up with trying to maintain a home at congested seacoast cities."

Oregon Has \$73 Million For Postwar Projects

SALEM, Ore., June 30—(AP)—The state postwar commission reported to Governor Snell yesterday that \$73,000,000 is available for postwar projects, enough to employ 36,000 men at \$1,800 a year for one year.

The commission said that 36,000 men is one-third of the estimated unemployment immediately after the war.

Besides the amount of money available, many more millions are expected from the federal government and other agencies.

The \$73,000,000 would come from the following sources: State cash \$13,541,121, counties cash \$2,000,000, highway commission \$10,000,000, Multnomah-Portland Moses plan \$24,000,000, Willamette valley project \$20,000,000, Deschutes project \$1,250,000, cities \$750,000 and school districts \$70,000.

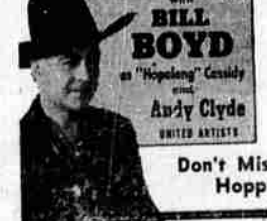
