Directors of the Umpqua Savings and Loan association have ordered a dividend of three per cent to be created July 1, after setting up necessary reserves, it was announced at the annual meeting of stockholders held at the offices of the association Wednesday night.

The sum of \$300,000 is available for Douglas county loans through the association's membership in the Federal Home Loan bank.
