Military Leaders Put Job Slackers in Deserter Class

WASHINGTON, June 30—(AP)—The nation's top military commanders put war job slackers in a class with deserters and over-optimism at home, they say, is threatening to prolong the war.

In a special report to President Roosevelt, the heads of the army, navy and air forces last night deplored what they termed an over-optimistic state of mind on the home front and declared that "any slackening in the needed production will only delay ultimate victory."

The report was signed by Gen. George C. Marshall, chief of staff; Admiral Ernest J. King, top navy chief, and Gen. H. H. Arnold, head of the air forces. The three military chiefs visited London and the French front shortly after the allies made their successful drive across the English channel. Their report to the president was their first word on the home-front reaction to what they termed "the recent favorable course of the fighting."

Losses Must Be Replaced
The production might of American industry and labor, they said, is virtual assurance of eventual victory, but they warned:

"This (victory) depends, however, on a continuance of the full support now given to the fighting forces by the home front."

"The battles now in progress entail heavy losses in material which American industry must replace, and any slackening in the needed production will only delay ultimate victory. No effort required in the home-front battle should be diverted by any element in the production machine—whether it be ownership, management, rank-and-file workers, or those in the service of the government itself."

They said recent victories have "persuaded some people that the war is as good as won, and that accordingly they can throw up their war jobs and go back to civilian life."

"No doubt most of the men at the front would also like easier and better paid peacetime jobs," they added, "but they are sticking to the jobs they have now."

Yukon Gas Again 75 Cts. Per Gallon

WHITEHORSE, Y. T., June 30—(CP)—The retail price of gasoline in the Yukon territory will be increased from 40 to 75 cents per imperial gallon effective tomorrow. It was announced today by the United States' northwest service command.

Prior to launching the Alaska highway construction the price was 75 cents, army officials said. Freight congestion over the White Pass and Yukon railway during construction resulted in American army officials selling gasoline from their storage tanks for local consumption at 45 cents per gallon.

With the railroad, which is operated by the army, now in a position to resume hauling tank cars, decision was made to re-establish the price at 75 cents.

Public Debt of America Now Over \$200 Billion

WASHINGTON, June 30—(AP)—The public debt has passed the 200 billion dollar mark. The Treasury's daily statement for the close of business Wednesday, issued today, reported the gross public debt, including guaranteed obligations of the government at \$200,230,958,523.06.

The public debt has been increasing sharply recently, reflecting war bond sales in the Fifth war loan drive. Each bond sale automatically increases the debt.

Since the war loan drive opened June 12, the public debt has increased more than 11 billion dollars.

OVEN CANNING DANGEROUS

CHICAGO—A.P.—The safest way to preserve fruits and vegetables is by the boiling water bath and the open kettle method, says the National Safety Council after a study of 1943 canning accidents.

Eighty per cent of last year's home canning accidents were caused by the oven canning method, the council said. About 15 per cent were caused by pressure canning. Comparatively few mishaps occurred when open kettles and boiling water were used. More accidents occurred with beans than with any other vegetable.
