Henry Armstrong Drops Verdict to John Thomas

LOS ANGELES, July 5—(AP)—Twenty-one-year-old John Thomas

Thomas battered his way to a unanimous decision and revenge last night in a furious encounter with former triple titleholder Henry Armstrong, 10 years his senior.

There were no knockdowns. Thomas weighed 130, Armstrong 139 1/4.
