

Public Address System Purchase Planned by Eagles

Purchase of a public address system, suitable for use at sports events and public gatherings, is the primary purpose of the Eagles lodge in the waste paper salvage drive to be made Friday and Saturday, Bruce Elliott, publicity chairman, reported today. The equipment will be turned over to the park commission for use in connection with the public recreation program.

The drive will be conducted during the two days, utilizing trucks donated by the several mill companies.

All newspapers and magazines to be contributed to the drive should be tied into bundles, each about 12 inches in height, and stacked at the curbline Thursday night. Collections will start early Friday morning, but it will not be possible for the trucks to retrace their routes. Consequently all contributed paper should be set out Thursday, it was stated.

The Eagles lodge will sell the paper and utilize all proceeds for the public recreation fund.

Shattering of Jap Bases Moving Nearer Tokyo

troops left the worst terrain behind them as they squeezed the Japanese into the northeast corner. More than 7,000 of the enemy have been slain.

The invaders opened a quick supply route near their front line by seizing Tanapag harbor well up the west coast. In this advance, they completed occupation of shell-shattered Garapan, main city on Saipan, and also took the town of Tanapag. On the east coast, the Yanks were within four miles of the island's northeastern tip.

The unconquered Eighth of the island is largely terraced tableland in contrast with the overrun mountainous areas where the Japs converted each cave into a stronghold.

In the southwest Pacific, Gen. MacArthur's troops, which quickly won an airfield on Noemfoor, opened a power-house push Monday toward a second "drome," backed by reinforcements parachuted to the beachhead.

Between the Saipan and Noemfoor invasion scenes, the far eastern air force dealt a fairly heavy blow at Yap and also raided Palau and Woleai in the western Carolines.

Tokyo radio, in referring to the Bonin-Volcano attacks, spoke of "heavy fighting" which Berlin radio promptly interpreted as a commando raid. Inasmuch as Nimitz made no mention of any landings, it appeared the Japs either referred to heavy aerial action or reflected fears that such attacks presaged landings.

Sea Losses Cripple Japs

Secretary Forrestal, disclosing the latest bag of submarines, declared that the undersize craft deserve "the lion's share of the credit for knocking the props from under Japan's conquest."

Forrestal said that the rate of sinking of the Japanese merchant fleet would be accelerated "and has caught up with the Jap retreat."

Japan, he said, "is losing merchant ships faster than she can afford to" and continuation of the current trends "will leave her by the end of 1944 with a sizable and growing deficit."

The war against Japan, he said, had moved at "a faster pace than we had hoped for."

But he warned against overconfidence, saying that the main battles are still to come and they will be "bitter and costly."

We are now approaching, he said, "the place where we can force the Japanese in the Pacific to stand up and fight."

Main battles still to come, he predicted, will likely occur on land with infantry organizations beating the Jap army.

In the latest bag, in addition to the two combatant vessels, there were two medium-sized tankers of major importance in maintaining the Japanese war machine, five medium cargo transports, three small cargo vessels, a large cargo vessel and one small cargo vessel in an done small cargo transport.

nominee will have no way of doing it.

"Rules of Game" Ignored

"The other resolution is that if the national convention should seat delegates from Texas other than those named by the Texas convention the electors . . . are instructed not to vote for the nominee of the party, but for some other democrat."

"However this will not be operative if the national convention seats only the delegates named by the Texas democratic state convention."

"It must now be obvious to the

thousands of Texas voters who did not participate in the state convention, as well as to some who sat in the councils of that convention, that the effect of its action was to change the rules of the game as we have always known them in Texas, or indeed, as we have known them since this country settled down to the two-party system.

Roosevelt Not Affected

"The right of the Texas democratic convention to express its feeling by resolution is not at issue. That right is assured in the constitution by the guarantees of freedom of speech, freedom of assembly, and right of petition."

"Again, Texas democrats cannot be criticized for instructing their delegates to the national convention to work for the things that, in their opinion, should be in the party platform."

"Especially does this apply to the restoration of the two-thirds rule. Through the operation of this rule, southern democrats—the solid south—were, in the past, accorded the influence in the party's deliberations to which their consistent loyalty to democratic party principles entitles them. Without it, they are deprived of the place at the party's council tables they justly deserve."

"The widespread southern desire for the restoration of the two-thirds rule could not effect President Roosevelt. The president obtained his first nomination under the two-thirds rule. Its retention would have had no effect upon his subsequent nominations, nor would the two-thirds rule, if applicable this year, serve in any way to prevent the overwhelming nomination of President Roosevelt as the party nominee."

WASHINGTON, July 5—(AP)

An aide said today Secretary Jesse Jones "will support President Roosevelt for reelection, but will not go beyond the statement" contained in his signed editorial in the Houston Chronicle criticizing Texas democrats for refusing to bind electors to vote for the party nominee.

Jones' assistant said it was his further opinion that the seating in the national convention of the uninvited 48-vote Texas delegation would go far toward solving the intra-party squabble in the Lone Star state. This delegation was chosen at the regular state convention which freed the electors to vote as they pleased in the electoral college should the national convention go against their demands for "white supremacy" in Dixie voting.

Andrew Ivie, 23, was back in jail today after only a few hours of liberty in which to celebrate the Fourth of July. Sheriff Bud Carter reported. After completing a short jail term for drunkenness, Ivie was released from custody Tuesday morning, but by evening was back in jail again. He pleaded guilty to a charge of drunkenness in a public place and was sentenced by Judge Thomas Hartfield to 30 days in jail and a fine of \$25.

George Maki, who also celebrated the Fourth with a bottle, was in jail in lieu of a \$10 fine, following his plea of guilty to a charge of being drunk in a public place, Judge Hartfield said.

Fines paid in the justice court included Lawrence C. Walker, \$15 speeding with a truck; Harold L. Leech, \$15, overloaded truck; Albert H. Vanderhoff, \$25, axle overload.

Theodore Roosevelt's Relics Saved From Fire

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., July 5—(AP)—Priceless relics of Theodore Roosevelt were saved today when fire broke out in a garage on the Sagamore hill estate of the late president and spread to the main house, damaging a wing of the mansion.

Firemen confined the blaze to a section of the home away from where the Roosevelt mementos are kept.

The Long Island home was unoccupied. Mrs. Roosevelt, widow of the 26th president, was reported vacationing.

Origin of the blaze, which demolished the garage and a cottage on the estate, was undetermined.

Pricing Survey of Roseburg's Meat Shops Scheduled

A pricing and posting survey of meat stores in Roseburg will be conducted beginning July 6, by price panel assistants of the Roseburg area War Price and Rationing board, Board Chairman L. V. Hammock announced today.

He said that the survey, first to be devoted solely to meats, will cover ceiling and selling prices of rationed and non-rationed meat cuts, as well as a check on proper OPA posting requirements. Two price panel clerks will visit local meat markets to help retailers understand OPA regulations.

"This is another step in our program to bring about better retail prices," Hammock explained in pointing out that volunteer workers would explain regulations to butchers and help correct any misunderstanding. They also will tell retailers how and where to obtain information on wholesale ceiling prices.

"Most of our meat dealers have demonstrated their interest in the successful operation of this price-control measure. However, a few are still not complying with regulations simply because they don't understand exactly what they should do," Mr. Hammock declared. "By helping them, our survey will also aid the many retailers who are complying," he added. The local meat check is a part of a nation-wide compliance program conducted by the majority of OPA's local boards.

Shuttle Raid Staged

Flying Fortresses completed a three-stop shuttle flight from Britain to Russia to Italy to Britain, bombing French rail yards on the last leg of their 7,000-mile flight. Other U. S. heavies from Italy bombed the naval base of Toulon, graveyard of the scuttled French Fleet. Still others hit air-dromes in Holland and Belgium and robot bomb sites in France. Mediums struck hard at the battle front, which Gen. Eisenhower toured in a Mustang fighter yesterday.

The Germans continued to hurl robot bombs at England but in rather aimless fashion. Even these, the German magazine Das Schwarze Korps conceded, had been loosed to save Hitler's Nazi regime from an internal crisis of the utmost gravity. In great force last night, British bombers attacked the aerodromes from which the aerial torpedoes are launched in northern France. Air power smote the Germans yesterday in eight countries—Germany, Russia, Poland, Italy, France, Romania, Yugoslavia and Albania.

More air attacks were in progress today. Flight Lt. P. M. C. Hill only son of Sir Roderic Hill, chief of air defense for Great Britain, has been killed in action, it was announced at London today.

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DeGaulle Due In U. S. Tomorrow to Confer With F. R.

WASHINGTON, July 5—(AP)—General Charles DeGaulle, leader of the French national committee, is scheduled to arrive here tomorrow in his first visit to this country.

An elaborate welcome has been prepared for the French general who is coming for a series of talks with President Roosevelt. How much substantial accomplishment they will be able to wring out of the formalities remains a question.

Just before leaving Algiers, DeGaulle made a Fourth of July statement praising America's idealism, power and courage which was regarded here as unusually friendly for the French leader. Diplomats studied it as possibly presaging the attitude he intends to maintain in his conversations with the president.

His plan to see the president apparently was based originally on the hope that it might result in substantial progress toward DeGaulle's goal of formal recognition for the French National Committee of Liberation as the provisional government of France.

This is contrary to American policy which provides that until half or more of France is liberated and the people have a chance to express their preference in governments, the United States will not recognize the committee.

But the policy was determined by President Roosevelt and could be modified by him should he decide the time is right for a change.

The sector where the red army is exerting the most pressure toward the route is through the lake-dotted country between Wilno and Daugavpils, the northern prong of this advance carrying westward toward the latter city from Polotsk, which fell yesterday.

Wilno (sixth largest city in Old Poland), stands astride the Warsaw-Leningrad railway, while Kaunas is an important junction on the route from east Prussia. The cities are 50 miles apart.

Some red army units today were reported less than 60 miles from Wilno to the northeast and there were no indications that the Germans were stiffening.
