**Alley's Vacation Voted**  
A resolution to vacate a portion of the Railroad alley abutting the properties of the Page Lumber and Fuel company and the Interstate Tractor and Machinery company in North Roseburg was approved. The resolution provides that the city shall have an easement to permit repairs to sewer lines, and the vacation was made contingent upon the property owners granting easement to city to provide access to sewers on portions of a north and south alleyway vacated a number of years ago.

In accordance with agreement formulated at the time the city budget was prepared, setting aside the sum of \$1400 for participation in the city-wide summer recreation program, the council authorized transfer of the sum from the emergency fund to the park commission with instructions to report back the purposes for which the money is expended.

Applications of The Club Cigar store and Kampfer's Sav-Mor for beer licenses were approved, but the application of The South Roseburg cafe was denied.

A request for installation of a street light at the corner of N. 2nd Ave. West was referred to the committee on electric lights for investigation.

# Salpan Japs Continue Last Ditch Defense

North Dutch New Guinea. The five newly-announced sinkings added to a debacle suffered by the Japanese when a task force moved between Salpan and Japan earlier this week to shell and bomb the Volcano and Bonin Islands.

In a Thursday communique, Adm. Nimitz disclosed that the two-day operation was extended to Chichi Jima in the Bonins, where two enemy destroyer escorts, an oiler, an ammunition ship and a cargo vessel were sunk. He also added to previously announced Japanese air losses nine more planes shot down and three damaged at Haha Jima.

This addition made the total Jap losses in the Volcano and Bonino groups for the two days: 10 ships definitely sunk, including three destroyers previously reported; six ships probably sunk; more than 20 ships damaged; 73 planes definitely shot down; 16 planes probably downed and 27 planes destroyed or damaged on the ground.

**Score Favors Americans**  
Nimitz' amplification added seven more planes to the American losses, making a total of 16 for the two days.

Since June 10, Japanese air losses related to the Salpan operations total 835 as against the loss of 168 American planes and 107 men.

Enemy plans for a bloody, drawn out defense of the only airfield they still hold on invaded Noemboor received a severe foil

by the latest amphibious operation of Gen. MacArthur's men. Covered by warships and planes, the Yanks swept unopposed on to tiny Manim Islet and set up artillery to shell Number airfield three miles away on Noemboor's west coast. In a lightning operation, invaders from reef-climbing landing craft and sky transports previously had overrun the other two airfields on Noemboor.

stubborn defense at Arezzo, 36 miles southeast of Florence, which is giving Marshal Kesselring time to bolster his main Gothic line defenses in the northern Apennines.

Arezzo is a junction of five railway routes and four main highways.

Lt. Gen. Sir Oliver Leese's infantry and tanks yesterday drove the enemy from 2,815-foot Monte Lignano, four miles south of Arezzo, despite concentrations of enemy guns on its reverse slopes and curtains of machinegun fire.

Polish troops on the Adriatic coast took the town of Numana, but no gains were reported in the Osimo area by allies attempting to reach Ancona, nine miles beyond.

The Mediterranean air force launched its first really concentrated attack on enemy communications and oil installations in northern Italy yesterday.

Last night RAF heavies bombed Feuerbrunn airdrome, 30 miles outside Vienna, while Mosquitos strafed a train at Toulouse in France, and Beaufighters strafed another at Aries in southern France.

tory out of full operation. It is presumed that at least in the initial attack on Yawata the American bombardiers gave particular attention to hitting the coke-making plants at the steel mills. The coke units, chiefly of brick construction, are easily smashed by bomb concussion. And without coke, the steel mills themselves cannot function.

Sasebo is one of the four main home bases of the Japanese navy. It includes one of the most productive shipbuilding yards at the disposal of the navy, turning out a large proportion of its submarines, destroyers and other smaller warcraft.

Since the outbreak of the war with China in 1937 Sasebo probably has been the business center of all the Japanese bases, since most of the warcraft used in China waters and further south have been fitted out and repaired there.

# Circus Holocaust Death Toll Mounts to 159

tabulated that the huge canvas tent had been coated with a water-proof solution of gasoline and paraffine before the circuit left its winter quarters at Sarasota, Fla., early in the year.

In contrast to the stories of various persons present when the fire broke out yesterday, shortly after the opening of the afternoon performance that the blaze originated low in the tent, Hal Oliver, circus press representative, said the fire definitely started at the roof of the tent.

And he added: "We have a theory, but we're not making it public now. We expect to make an announcement later." He further declared that "absolutely no credence was being given any theory of incendiary or sabotage."

# Most of Dead Children

The fire, the greatest disaster in American circus history, reduced the show's main tent to ashes within less than an hour yesterday.

State police on duty at the temporary morgue estimated that two-thirds of the dead were children and said most of the adult victims were women.

Only the first act, the performance of the trained animals, had been completed when the blaze, at first so small that, as one witness said, it could have been extinguished with a bucket of water, was seen near the main entrance of the big top.

Survivors agreed that the circus staff had tried valiantly to prevent panic. The first move toward the exits was orderly and many of the children making their way from the tiers of seats were seen laughing excitedly.

But when the flames roared with terrifying speed to consume the entire canvas roof, the audience became a fighting screaming, terror-stricken mass.

Some children dropped to the ground were trampled unconscious by others jumping behind them. Others were tangled in the blazing canvas.

The performing animals had been safely herded through the caged runway back to their trucks when the blaze was first seen and only five circus performers, the "Flying Wallendas," were in the arena.

It was the animal runway, spectators said, which trapped many of the audience under the fiery canvas as it fell.

**Show's Future Doubtful**  
The circus' future remained doubtful today, although most of its staff agreed that it would return to its Sarasota winter quarters as soon as authorities here would permit removal of the remaining equipment.

Herbert Duval, circus adjuster, declared, "we're out of business." But Roland Butler, general press representative, predicted that the show would return to the road later this summer, perhaps using last year's tent which he said "still is in pretty good shape."

Butler reported that all the show's animals were saved and that none of the performers had been injured seriously.

Estimates of the fire loss ranged from \$75,000 to \$300,000, but no authoritative report on damage had been issued by the management.

# Chinese Break Japanese Siege of Hengyang

In all sectors the spokesman said the Chinese had broken into the Japanese stronghold of Liling, about 80 miles northeast of Hengyang, and that street fighting was in progress. A Japanese column which had branched out eastward from Liling had been pushed back more than 30 miles, he said.

Meanwhile the Chinese were now attacking in the Yolo mountains across the Siang river from Changsha, the Japanese-held capital of Hunan.

**U. S. Air Force Credited**  
Although the siege of Hengyang had been lifted, the Japanese still were on three sides of the city.

The defenders at Hengyang held on for 12 bitter days before relief came from Chinese troops. The spokesman emphasized the credit due to the American air force which, he said, disorganized Japanese supply lines, particularly on the main artery, the Siang river, by its bombing and strafing attacks on hundreds of boats and small rivercraft.

These attacks were a great factor, he said, in turning back the threat of six Japanese divisions numbering between 110,000 and 120,000 men.

"The time will come soon, perhaps before another 12 months have passed, when the Japanese will be driven forever from Chinese soil," predicted Maj. Gen. Chennault, commander of U. S. army air forces in China.

"We are now drawing into position to strike straight at the heart of the Japanese empire," Chennault added.

dent, said the Germans still were strongly entrenched at Caen. **Reich Plants Blasted**

Eight airforce fighters, escorting more than 1,000 Flying Fortresses and Liberators in attacks on airplane factories and oil refineries at seven places in central Germany this morning, shot down 75 German enemy fighters in the greatest air battle since D-day.

Nearly 1,000 fighters convoyed the big bombers. German broadcasts said another U. S. force was attacking the Reich from the south.

The Germans offered the most desperate resistance in the air in several weeks, sending up 100 planes near Leipzig.

American Fortresses and Liberators drove deep into the heart of Germany and dropped thousands of tons of bombs on the Leipzig suburbs of Mockau and Lutendorf and other places.

A big airplane works at Mockau has been hit several times before and the Germans undoubtedly have been striving to rehabilitate it to bolster the steadily dwindling Luftwaffe. The attack was a violent follow-up of a double American blow yesterday at the Kiel naval base and the rocket bomb cradles in the Pas-De-Calais department of France.

The Germans said the force attacking from Italy dropped bombs near the Austria-Hungary border and pushed on over Czechoslovakia into German Silesia. A Vienna airdrome was bombed last night along with oil and rail facilities in northern Italy.
