## Rules Governing Used Auto Sales Announced Here

Following a conference at the Roseburg OPA office Friday with Robert MacLeod, price specialist from the district OPA office, L. V. Hammock, chairman of the local board, announces that prices for used passenger automobiles are established for cars when sold "as is" and when sold as "warranted."

Mr. MacLeod states that "only dealers can use warranted prices. A dealer must first of all have facilities for reconditioning used cars and, second, must have a place to display used cars. Anyone who wishes to qualify as a dealer must meet both these conditions. If he does not he cannot sell at warranted prices unless he is approved as a dealer by the office of price administration. In order to be approved, he must show that he has working arrangement for having cars repaired with some establishment which has adequate facilities for repairing. He must also show that he is financially responsible for making his warranty good.

"Every person selling a used car must complete a certificate of transfer showing that the selling price conforms to maximum price regulation No. 540. This certificate of transfer must be signed by both the seller and the purchaser and must be submitted to the local OPA board by the purchaser when making application for gas rations.

"Another important point is that maximum price regulation 540 lists ceiling prices for most cars of 1937 models and later. There is a ceiling price, however, on all used cars. Used cars manufactured prior to 1937 have the same ceiling price as the comparable 1937 make and model. It is assumed that the earlier models will sell for less than the 1937 prices, as sales may be made at any price below the ceiling price.

"Persons who do not qualify as dealers under this regulation and who wish to be approved as dealers, should make application to the local OPA board. Likewise any person having questions arising from this regulation should apply to the local OPA price division for more information."
